The Trouble in Buenos Ayres.

THROUGH the kindness of a prominent diplomatic representative at Washington, the New York Herald's correspondent at that place has been able to obtain a fair insight into the actual condition of affairs at Buenos Ayres, and the true inwardness of the uprising against the present Argentine administration.

An United States View.

The tariff is a dry and tedious subject, but Mr. Andrew Carnegie's "Summing up the Tariff Discussion" in the July number of the North American Review, invests it with fresh interest.

Building up his argument upon the "teachings of the fathers" in support of a protective tariff, and quoting the memorable utterances of Hamilton, Madison, Jefferson, Monroe and Jackson to illustrate the difference between the old land and the new, Mr. Carnegie strongly fortifies their position with the maxim formulated by the great political economist, John Stuart Mill, that every new nation should seek to develop its latent manufacturing powers, by creating protective duties.

This question has been answered affirmatively for their respective countries, by all English-speaking people throughout the world; and even in old Europe, the leading nations, all backed by public opinion, have been led to the conclusion that it is essential to levy protective duties in order to establish manufactures.

The question of free trade or protection is then one of condition; not a science applicable everywhere. It is good for some countries, not for others. "As I am an Englishman," says Labouchere, "I am in favor of free trade; but if I were an American, I should be in favor of protection."

A PROFITABLE YEAR.—The report of the superintendent of insurance shows that last year was a very profitable one for companies doing business in Canada. The cash premiums received during last year by fire companies amounted to \$5,588,016, exceeding those of the previous year by \$150,753.

Election Notes.

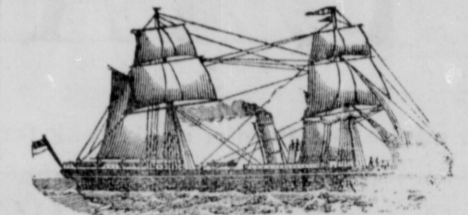
