Christian College Here Holds First Graduation

On Thursday and Friday evenings the first graduation services of the Maritime Christian College were held in the buildings of the Central Christian Church, Charlottetown.

On Thursday evening a banquet was served by the ladies of the local church in the gymnasium of the educational building. A large number of local friends and visitors from across the island attended. Donald Stewart, member of the board of directors, spoke words of greeting to all those connected with the College.

Thursday evening Commencement services were held in the church auditorium. Her Frank Strachan, Manchester, New Hampshire and director of the New England Christian Mission delivered an address. Merle Zimmerman, chairman of the College board of directors presided.

John E. Cameron of Charlottetown presided at the ceremony. Cameron Memorial Prize for the highest mark in the college was awarded to the student who received the highest mark in this year.

BIOLOGIST SEES WORLD THREAT

BOSTON (AP)—Sir Julian Huxley, British biologist, author and lecturer, says: "The trouble is, any damn moment we may all get blown up."

The 76-year-old scientist in a Boston Globe interview here said the most immediate problem we face is to see we don't get blown to smithereens in a nuclear war.

"The trouble with this 'ultimate deterrent' everyone talks about is that it's likely to turn into an 'ultimate deceiver' that will wipe us all off the earth."

Sir Julian foresaw the day when all present forms of government — "including the so-called free enterprise system of America and the would-be Communist system of the Soviet Union" will become as "extinct as dinosaurs."

In the face of fantastic changes taking place in the world, he said, man will soon have to "completely re-think" his concepts of current socio-economic orders.

The world, he added, is heading into a period of increasingly harsh competition between man and machines—and machines eventually will win.

The question that will then arise is "what are people good for, anyway, if they can't work?"

The answer, he said, may be going out climbing mountains, or sitting around reading or writing or painting landscapes.

1st Baptists Mark 5th Anniversary

Mr. Noble was born at Woodstock, N.B. He received his BA from Acadia and his DD from Newton in 1947. He has been pastor, assistant pastor or supply in all three Maritime Provinces and pastor in the United States. He was pastor of the German Street Baptist Church in Saint John.

Special music will be provided. Frank Wood will sing, "King of Glory" and Mrs. David Cox will sing "Come Ye Blessed of My People." Mrs. Ivy Hennessy will sing "I Hear A Forest Praying" at the evening service.

Island Jersey Sets Record

A Prince Edward Island Jersey cow, Western Grey, owned by the late Mr. W. J. MacRae, was the second highest producer in the senior 3-year old class that qualified on record of performance tests reported in May.

The cow, named "Milkmaid," learned last night from the head office of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club in Toronto.

The heifer which is owned by James Vickerson, North River, produced 11,214 pounds milk, 625 butterfat for an average test of 5.7 per cent which is a Silver and Gold Seal record.

TANKER IN TOW

LONDON (AP)—Owners of the British tanker London Splendid said Friday the crippled vessel has been taken in tow by a sister ship Overseas Pioneer in the Caribbean and was moving toward Havana. A spokesman for the owners, London and Overseas Freighters, Ltd., said the London Splendid's engines had broken down but that the sea was calm and she was in no danger. The tanker is registered carrying 24,000 tons of Soviet oil.

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United Church Paper Blasts Radio Commercials Program

TORONTO (CP)—The United Church Observer blasts religious radio commercials that will be broadcast here starting in July.

The paper accuses its church of "American religiosity at its worst" and of sacrificing good taste, dignity, theology and common sense.

The advertising project is sponsored jointly by the United Church of Canada and the Anglican Church.

After a month of about 125 to 300 commercials a day, a survey will be taken to decide if the program will be carried on.

Rev. Keith Willard, director of broadcasting, said in an interview the views of the paper's editor, Rev. A. C. Forrest, are not those of the United Church. The religious messages supplied by the United Presbyterian Church in the United States are to be offered to all eight Toronto stations and others near Toronto in Oshawa, Brampton and Oakville.

Charles Praught Re-elected V-P Of Diabetic Ass'n

Charles E. Praught returned this week from attending as a delegate from the Charlottetown and District Branch, the annual meeting of the Canadian Diabetic Association held at Toronto May 8 and 9. 30 delegates from all across Canada were in attendance.

Dr. J. A. Hunter was elected president and Mr. Praught was re-elected national vice-president for the coming year.

During the meeting many items of interest to diabetics were discussed. Among these was the high prices charged for anti-diabetic drugs and testing materials in Canada. One medical doctor, who had done much research in this regard, estimated approximately two million dollars were spent needlessly on these drugs by diabetics each year. The Association passed a resolution to take a "clean" look into the matter.

Although in Prince Edward Island all diabetics receive free eye examinations, the Association was much interested in this discussion to endeavor to reduce the cost of the program, if at all possible.

At the Annual Dinner of the Association Mr. Praught was presented with the "President's Award of Merit" in appreciation.

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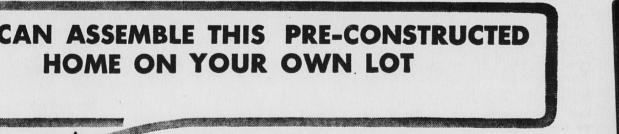
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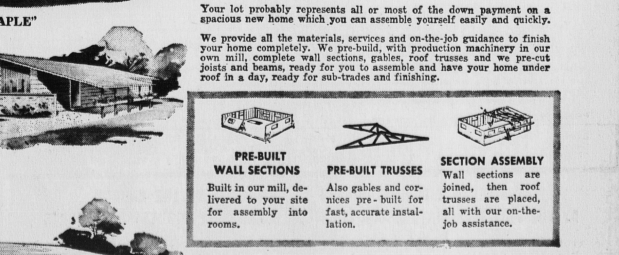
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
