NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

**What a Commission is for—
Bad Prospects for the
Lumber Trade.**

OTTAWA, July 29.—Edward Farrar has
got a job from the Government. He has
been engaged to prepare a report of the
Commissioners appointed to enquire into
the management of the St. Vincent De
Paul penitentiary.

The imposition of an American duty of
\$2 on lumber will seriously affect this
district and during the coming winter in-
stead of some six thousand hands be-
ing employed only from 500 to 700 will
be working.

FATAL COLLISION AT SEA

**A Barquentine With Her Captain His
Wife and Four of the Crew

BOSTON, July 29.—The British steamer
Scandinavian, from Liverpool, reports the
running down and sinking of the barquentine
Florence White in a dense fog, twenty
miles south of Cape Race, last Saturday.
The captain's wife and four of the crew of
the Florence were drowned.

C. B., to St. John's, Nfld.

TROUBLE IN INDIA.

Native Agitators Arrested.

BOMBAY, July 29.—The recent uprising
in Swatvalley has led the Government to
adopt a policy of suppression toward the
native agitators, who in speeches and
through the native press have for a long
time been endeavoring to promote a spirit
of revolt. In pursuance of this policy a
number of arrests have already been made
and others are expected to follow.

THE COLONIAL PREMIERS.

Barren Results of Their Visit.

LONDON, July 29.—The Daily News, in
an article referring to the visit of the col-
onial premiers, says: "Cultivating the
colonial premiers seems to have led to
results as meagre as ploughing the sea
sands."

Cloudburst and Freshet.

MONCTON, July 29.—A cloudburst and
freshet fell over the Little and Pollet rivers
in Salisbury on Saturday. Streams that
were almost dry in less than an hour were
rushing torrents ten feet deep.

NEWS NOTES.

Living in the Klondyke gold region is
expensive. Flour costs twelve dollars
per hundred pounds, eggs a dollar and a
half a dozen, and butter two dollars per
pound, with other articles of food in pro-
portion.

The reply speaks of the disastrous effects
to Japanese interests in the Pacific of the
European colonization scheme, and says
the Imperial Government could not hold
with indifference changes in the situation
of these Governments that extinguishes
Japanese rights.

Some attention has been attracted by an
article in the Prusche Jatrucher, advoc-
ating the return of Metz to France. The
writer argues that the annexation of Lux-
embourg is impossible without the consent
of Metz in exchange for Luxembourg. He
says that Prince Bismarck opposed the
annexation of Metz in 1871, but that Count
Von Moltke insisted upon it for military
reasons. The article concludes: "The
position of Germans in Metz is a constant
menace to France, who will never forget
its thirst for revenge as long as the Ger-
mans retain the city. True Germans be-
lieve that the victor owes the vanquished
the duty of making the first advance toward
reconciliation."

A definite answer is expected from the
British Government within the next few
days to the proposal of the United States
and France for a bi-metallic conference.
The United States bi-metallic commis-
sioners are confident that the invitation
will be accepted, but the movement meets
with the solid opposition of the British
capitalists, who argue that the British
financial system is satisfactory and that
the Government should not be called upon
to assist other Governments that may be
in distress. The only argument which
weighs with them in favor of a conference
is the fear that unless international action
is taken for the coinage of silver, the free
silver party will succeed in the United
States and bring on a financial panic, in
which British investments would suffer.
It is understood that this argument has
been most active in endeavouring to enlist
the support of the Rothschilds and other
big financiers.

The Mayor of Toronto has received the
following letter from Sir Wilfrid Laurier:

"HOTEL CECIL,
"LONDON, July 15th, 1897.
"SIR,—I beg to inform you that on the
7th instant I had the honor of presenting
to the Queen in person, at Windsor Castle,
the address entrusted to my care contain-
ing the congratulations of the city of
Toronto on the occasion of the completion
of the 90th year of Her Majesty's reign.
The address was graciously received by the
Queen, who commanded me to transmit,
in Her Majesty's own words, the follow-
ing reply:

"I request you to convey to the munici-
pality of Toronto my sincere thanks for
their loyal and dutiful address, which I
accept with great pleasure and gratifica-
tion. I have much admired the casket
which testifies to the varied and valuable
resources of the Dominion of Canada."
"I am, sir, your obedient servant,
"WILFRID LAURIER."

The assessment figures of four or six
wards of Toronto show an increase in
population since last year of 3,151. At
the present rate of increase it is estimated
that within five years every vacant house
in Toronto will be filled.

That Japan will continue to oppose the
Hawaiian annexation treaty is conclusively
shown by the latest protest of the Japanese
Government, under date of July 10, which
is now made public. While couched in
polite and diplomatic language, the protest
is sufficiently firm in tone to show that
Japan will continue to wage a diplomatic
war to prevent the consummation of the
annexation policy. Japan's reply in part
is as follows:—

"Taking note of what you say in reply
to the representation I have the honor to
make on behalf of my Government, with
reference to the necessity of maintaining
the status quo of Hawaii, the Imperial
Government has no hesitation in admitt-
ing the predominant influence of the United
States in the Hawaiian Islands. In their
opinion, however, the very fact that such
predominance has existed so long unques-
tioned might be urged as a reason against
the disturbance of the status quo, more
especially as practically the whole popula-
tion of Hawaii acknowledge the paramount
importance of the relations of their country
with the United States, while it is un-
derstood that only a small fraction of their
number favor annexation."

LONDON, July 27.—A despatch from
Simla says that a large body of tribesmen
made an attack last night on Camp Kaka-
land, in the Chitral. In the fight that en-
sued Private Leonard Manley, of the 45th
Sikhs, was killed, Private Taylor severely
wounded, and Major Herbert and Lieut.
Watling, of the engineer corps, severely
hurt. The cavalry, with guides, is now
pursuing the enemy, who retreated this
morning.
