MASSACHUSETTS ELECTIONS.

Were the Cause of Many Surprises.

BOSTON, Dec 7.—There were a number of surprises in the municipal elections held in 16 of the 32 cities of the States yesterday, the greatest were in Boston and Haverhill.

In Brockton, which last year voted for license by over 600, the temperance advocates rolled up a majority against liquor selling of 2,100.

In Haverhill, the Socialist Democrats, defeated a large field of candidates for Mayor, including the present incumbent, and gained seats in both legislative branches.

In other cities there was little change in the license vote.

One of the features of the election was the victory for shoe-labor men in Marlboro, the candidate winning over the Republican who was supposed to have been supported by the manufacturers.

VINEYARD HEAVEN, Mass., Dec. 6—On account of the bad weather and delay of correspondence between owners and underwriters and because of interruption of telegraphic communication, little progress has been made towards floating wrecked vessels here. Nine of them have been condemned. Portions of their cargoes will, however, in most cases be saved. These vessels are: Schooners Sadie Willcutt, Hillsboro for New York, cargo of rock plaster; Rando, St. John for Fall River, lumber laden; Nellie Doe, St. John for New York, lumber laden.

NEW CUSTOMS RULE

Affecting Every Official in the Service.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—An important decision has been reached by the Minister of Customs, which will affect every officer in the Customs service who handles public money.

The system of private security or bondsmen for proper performance of duty by an officer will be abolished from the 1st January and every collector, sub-collector, landing waiter or special officer who receives money from the Government will be compelled to take out a policy with a Guarantee Company.

FRANCE TO GIVE UP.

She Will Abandon the Bhar-el-Ghazal Valley.

PARIS, Dec 6.—M Delcasse, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, in the course of a conversation the other day, admitted that Major Marchand had been ordered to retire from Fashoda by a long and toilsome route, because the French Government was afraid he would be made to much of should he return to France within six months. Marchand, it seems, is too terribly in earnest and too vain or too simple to understand that he is only a subordinate officer in the army, and that his business is to act, not to think. He has reached Fashoda by now, and doubtless will get out as quickly as possible.

It is understood that Capt Baratier will not travel with his chief. His orders are to tramp back through the Bah-el-Ghazal province, gathering up French flags and other impedimenta as he retires, finally halting within the frontier of Upper Ubangi. That is to say, the French Government has taken the hint delicately dropped by Lord Salisbury in the course of one of his memorable conversations with Baroo de Courcel, as recorded in the historic blue book. It may be assumed, therefore, that the Anglo-French Sudan difficulty has been settled.
