

EARL BEACONSFIELD has been vindicated. The Gladstone Government has decided, if necessary, that England alone, shall see the treaty of Berlin carried out!

ANOTHER valuable seam of coal has been discovered at Spring Hill, Cumberland County, N. S. The indications are that the coal is of excellent quality.

It is reported that a beet root sugar manufacturing company has been established at West Farnham, Que., with a capital of \$200,000. Twelve acres of land, it is said, have been purchased as a site for the buildings. The machinery has been ordered from France, and manufacturing will commence next fall.

THE news that the Brazilian Cortes has accepted the proposition of the Dominion Government and granted \$50,000 annually, as a subsidy to a line of Canadian steamers, is good news. Every new avenue opened up for foreign trade must benefit especially this portion of Canada. The Brazilians have shown that they are in earnest in this matter by arranging for the appointment of Vice-Consuls at St. John, Halifax, Quebec, Toronto and Ottawa.

A NEW rule with respect to the interest on deposits in the Government Savings Bank took effect on the 1st of October. The rate of interest is to remain at four per cent; but the interest will only be calculated from the first of every month. So that if a depositor puts in money on, say, the 15th of October, the interest will be calculated, not from that date, but from the first of November. Owing, we presume, to the fact that money is plentiful, five per cent. stock is no longer issued by the Savings Bank.

At the port of Summerside, there were entered for consumption during the month of September last, goods to the value of \$18,686, and the duty paid amounted to \$4,152.31. During the corresponding month of last year the goods entered for consumption at Summerside were valued at \$9,847—duty paid \$1,533.51. The increase this year in value of goods entered is \$8,837—duty paid \$2,618.80. The exports of Summerside during September, were: products of the fisheries, \$9,468; animals, \$730; oats, \$6,978. Totals, \$17,176. Not a bad exhibit.

We are told that at the funeral of Lord Mountmorris, there was a vast assemblage, and that the officiating Priest in his remarks said the moral sense of the Irish people had become so perverted by the teaching of the Land League orators and Nationalist newspapers that they regarded murder with indifference. It is said that a murmur of dissent from the priest's statement ran through the audience and that the Dublin papers deprecate in strong terms the utterances of the Rev. gentleman, and call attention to the fact that murders are less frequent in Ireland, in proportion to population, than in any other country; that the people are naturally keenly sensitive to the crime of taking life, and that while murder is always to be condemned and abjured as a means of attaining any end whatever, still, it should not be forgotten that the slaying of both Lord Leitrim and Lord Mountmorris was caused by alleged offences on their part of a heinous character against their tenants, and was therefore not a national, nor agrarian, but a personal matter.

A NOVEL scheme is on foot to people the vacant lands of certain districts of Quebec. It appears that some time since several persons in Montreal and Quebec obtained a grant of 100,000 acres of land from the Local Government in the counties of Compton and Beauce, in Quebec Province, for the purpose of bringing out English agriculturists and settling them upon farms thereon. The matter remained in abeyance for some time, until it was taken up by Rev. A. J. Bray, Montreal, Mr. Stockwell, and Mr. Caron, M. P., of Quebec. These gentlemen went to London some weeks ago, and there established a company with a capital of \$1,000,000. A board composed of capitalists in London was formed, and the stock soon taken up. The plan of operations is to lay out 100 acre farms, 10 acres to be cleared, a house built and some stock placed on it, all to be sold for \$500 on time. Mr. Bray will actively interest himself in the project by undertaking next spring a lecturing tour in the farming districts of England so as to enlighten the people on the advantages of the Province for settlement. Schools, churches and stores will be erected as the settlement progresses.

Major W. C. Drury, 8th Regiment, New Brunswick Cavalry, has been appointed aide-de-camp to His Honor Lieut. Governor Wilmot.

A Yarmouth man who, with about a dozen others, was induced to go out to Colorado last spring to work in a saw mill, writes a letter to the Yarmouth Herald giving some of his experiences and his impressions of the country, with a promise of further letters. One would judge from the present letter that Colorado is not a paradise. The Yarmouth man calls the State a sandy desert, and says that the season has been so unfavorable that stock is dying and the seed planted has refused to come up on account of long prevailing drought. Pueblo he describes as a small dirty town, over which the wind blows clouds of sand from the sand plains. Colorado's "cities" consist of "dugouts" and cabins, and if it was not for the money left by immigrants, many of whom spend all they have in trying to get settled, the State would speedily lose its reputation. This Yarmouth man advises all his young friends to steer clear of Colorado.
