**Mystery Craft To Seek New Speed Mark Today**

SEATTLE, June 20—(AP)—A mystery boat designed by a Seattle aircraft engineer goes after Sir Malcolm Campbell's world speed record tomorrow. Its name is *Slo-Mo-Shun IV*. It is reported unofficially to have churned over Lake Washington at a 150-mile-an-hour-or better-clip.

Although the roar of its 1,500-horsepower engine reverberates often around the lake, the speedy craft is still a mystery boat on home water. Stanley S. Sayres, the owner who has tested it carefully through many months, is mum on its speed.

The target is the 141.74-mile-an-hour record set by Sir Malcolm 11 years ago.

The speed record attempt will be under American Powerboat Association sanction. The craft will be allowed three official tries between tomorrow and Saturday.

The 28-foot boat was designed by Red O. Jones, a Boeing aircraft plant supervisor. It is powered by a 12-cylinder aircraft engine.

**Wouters Wins Decision Over Billy Fifield**

MONTREAL, June 21—(CP)—Canadian middleweight champion Roy Wouters of Montreal formerly of Vancouver, earned a 10-round unanimous decision over Billy Fifield of Toronto tonight in the semi-final of a boxing card. Wouters weighed 158 1/2 and Fifield 161. The bout was a non-title affair.

It was a slow-moving bout with Wouters, the aggressor throughout. The crowd continually called for the fighters to mix it.

**Bolero Leads In Ocean Yacht Race**

NEW YORK, June 20—(AP)—A Coast Guard plane patrolling the Newport-to-Bermuda yacht race reported tonight that the *Bolero* was showing the way in the 335-mile contest.

**French Boxer Wins At Montreal**

MONTREAL, June 20—(CP)—Laurent Dauthuille of France scored a sixth-round technical knockout over Tuzo Portugez of Costa Rica in a 10-round main bout on a boxing card here tonight that even saw referee Leo Fisher throwing a few punches.

Dauthuille weighed 150 1/2 and Portugez 160 1/2. A crowd of 7,000 fans contributed a gross gate of \$19,286.

The donnybrook came in the fifth round when Portugez hit Dauthuille with four low blows. When referee Fisher attempted to break the fighters and warn the Costa Rican, Portugez struck the official with half a dozen blows. Fisher then took the matter in his own hands and went after Portugez with a two-fisted attack.

The technical knockout, awarded to Dauthuille at the 2:38-minute mark of the sixth, came after the dusky Portugez was bent over the ropes and appeared helpless.

In a fast-moving, six-round preliminary, Rene Trudeau, 133 1/2, Montreal, scored a second-round knockout over Jackie Deam, 130, Halifax.

Trudeau dropped the dusky Halligan with a short right to the jaw and Deam stayed down for the full count.

Noel Gagnon, 124, Quebec, scored a six-round decision over Manny Spivak, 130, Montreal, in a rugged slugfest. Spivak took an eighth count and just managed to hang on until the final bell.

Armand Savoie, 135, Montreal, scored his 14th consecutive knockout when he dropped Danny McCall, 138, Philadelphia, at the 1:33-minute mark of the second round of a scheduled eight-rounder.

Savoie went to the canvas early in the first round but took an eight count and had things well in hand from there. McCall had to be helped from the ring.

**White Sox Do Well Under New Manager**

NEW YORK, June 20—(AP)—It's about time somebody called out Johnny (Red) Corriden to stand up and take a bow.

Since Corriden took charge of the Chicago White Sox May 27, they have played .500 ball. They won 15 and lost 10, about 340 points better than before he moved in.

Day after day Corriden sends out the same starting pitchers—Bob Cain, Bill Wight, Billy Pierce, Ken Holcombe and Ray Scarborough. Acquisition of the righthanded Scarborough proved a big boon because too many southpaws were one of Jack Onslow's big problems before he lost his job. In the first 31 games, including one tie, he started 28 left-handers.

When the Scarborough deal was completed two days after Corriden replaced Onslow, the club finally had a dependable starting right-hander. Later Ken Holcombe, the 31-year-old veteran "rookie", blossomed out as a starter.

Attendance spurred under Corriden, too. When Red became manager the Sox had drawn 113,625 for 13 home dates. In eight home dates since they have played to 117,827 for a season total of 231,452.

It took 62-year-old Corriden a long time to get a manager's job in the big time. He coached the Cubs, Dodgers and Yankees since 1931. Then last year he went out as manager at Salisbury, N. C. in the North Carolina State League, Class "D". Red finished seventh.

The first one deals with tennis and is entitled "Skimming The Net Is Bad"—"For some reason or other the idea that you should return the ball as close to the top of the net as possible has become popular. This is a serious mistake that causes a lot of unnecessary errors. When making your shot you should make sure you give it lots of air and figure on clearing the net by at least eight to 12 inches, sometimes more. If you are hitting into a wind, allow an even greater clearance. Keeping the ball close to the top of the net means your shots will land too short in your opponent's court and will greatly increase the possibility of error on your part. Exceptions to this rule are: (a) When you are lobbing. The ball should be 12 to 14 feet high in this case, and not hit too softly. (b) When your opponent is at the net, and you are trying to keep the ball low so that he must volley up instead of down into your court."

"In baseball circles there seems to be quite a difference of opinion regarding whether or not it pays to develop an organized base stealing strategy. Here are a few facts that will help you decide whether or not it is worthwhile. According to major league statistics, 67 percent of attempts to steal bases succeed in high school and college limit baseball, 76 per cent succeed. Teams winning either National or Major League pennants over the last 15 years have been noted for their base stealing record. Though speed is important and will help improve your base stealing record, a team without any exceptionally fast players can still do a good job.

"According to careful tests, it takes less time in a game of hardball for a man to go down to second base than it does for a pitcher to get the ball to a catcher, and the catcher to get the ball to second base. Therefore, if the base runner leaves at the right time, he should succeed in a great majority of attempts. Teams including base stealing emphasis for the first time have shown as much as 33 1/3 increase in their games won. This story adds up to a very clear situation—the individual player and the coach should not overlook this game-winning strategy! Incidentally, the player who can steal bases is worth his weight in gold."

The final pointer is for-track a lists who run the mile event: speed endurance and condition are all important. Keep these points in mind: (1) Get as much knowledge of who you will be running against as you possibly can, so that you can choose your tactics accordingly. (2) If you consider you are in better condition and have more endurance than the other, go out hard at the start and run that first three-quarter mile as hard as you can. If your opponents try to stay up with you, they will feel it more than you do. If they keep behind the pace, they will be too far back to worry you at the end of the race. You will have them over a barrel.

"If you have lots of speed and consider yourself the fastest man in the race, run behind the pace as loosely and easily as you can and try to come through in the last 150 yards. Do not force the pace at all, but try not to drop more than 10 yards at the most behind the leader. (3) Always sprint the first 35 yards of a race all out, because you will only be using nervous energy and will not tire yourself. If you start slowly you will lose ground you will have gained by utilizing this nervous energy that has been building up."
