SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

From Yesterday's
5 o'clock Edition.

LONDON, May 25.—The following despatch has been received from Madrid dated 1 a.m., Wednesday. "Nothing positive is revealed as to the situation."

Lieut.-General Correa, Minister of War, has received a cablegram from General Blanco saying that American warships are in front of Santiago.

Captain Annon, Minister of Marine, has received a lengthy despatch from Admiral Cervera replying in full to instructions.

The Minister of Marine receives nobody. He is working day and night. Yesterday he presented to the Queen Regent every detail of the plans at Santiago de Cuba, showing the defences and the security of Admiral Cervera's squadron.

Admiral Camana has gone back to Cadiz with sealed orders.

It is said that on his arrival there he will arrange for manoeuvres of ships at sea for trials of speed, gunnery and everything in order to satisfy himself that the squadron is in an efficient condition. He will then depart for a destination undivulged. Senor Cap Dep on Minister of the Interior says a telegram received by the war office from Manila reports that the natives are disposed to remain loyal to Spain and will defend the territory against foreign invasion.

The latest rumor is that a Spanish warship has captured an American warship in Cuban waters.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Reports to Adjt.-General Corbin, from the state camps show that one hundred and twelve thousand men have been mustered in the volunteer armies.

Jumel Mansion.

That the old Jumel mansion is to be moved instead of torn down shows that we have a little sentiment left. It means the lease of only a few more years of life to the house, for so soon as checkerboard lots are laid off in that quarter and 15 story offices and 10 story tenements rise around it that, too, will go the way of all other relics of a staidier and more leisurely time. The mansion was put up by Roger Morris in 1758. Washington stopped in it, and Mme. Jumel lived in it until 33 years ago. Our fury for so called improvement often carries us too far. There are few residences of the common sort put up in the busy districts of Manhattan that can claim any outward beauty, or enjoy the distinction which is imparted only by a surrounding of lawns. Everything is sacrificed to utility. Landmarks are desirable. We need them not merely as architectural lessons, but as historical assurances. Washington becomes more real to us when we can see the house in which he lodged. The war is a fact, not a tradition, when we see the crumpled masonry of Sumner. Poetry and legend attach themselves to these old houses, and they appeal to our kindly emotions. They are cool oases in the broiling desert of bricks and flagging. We can still spare room for the Jumel house and ought to have spared room for many others like it.—Brooklyn Eagle.

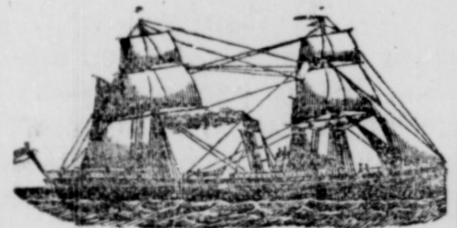
