A FEW weeks ago Mr. James Meikle, of Milton, who has for many years been afflicted with a very large tumor on his face, went to Boston for the purpose of having the tumor removed by means of a surgical operation; the str. Financial Panic.

CHICAGO, June 15. A panic was narrowly escaped in the Board of Trade to-day. Seven failures were announced in succession. An \$800,000 account of C. J. Kershaw & Co., one of the heaviest firms on change, was garished by Rosenfeld & Co., which resulted in a drop of July wheat from 86 to 70 1/2 cents.
