Fiendish Slayer Widely Sought By Maine Police

WATERVILLE, Me., May 5.—Kennebec River Valley authorities sought tonight a fiendish slayer who criminally assaulted and strangled little Mary Froulx, seven-year-old daughter of a school student, found the bound and gagged body of the child in a clump of alder bushes on the banks of Messalonskee stream today.

Police immediately linked the slaying with the unsolved murder of Annie Knights, 12, of Fairfield, the Froulx family lived in Fairfield, when the Knights girl was slain last October.

Circumstances of both crimes were similar, even to disposition of the bodies. In each instance, twisted bound the hands of the slain children. Portions of the Froulx girl's clothing were used to gag her even as Annie Knights had been silenced.

Highlights Of Speech

OTTAWA, May 5.—Following are highlights of former Premier Bennett's budget speech in the House of Commons.

The great improvement in economic conditions at the end of 1935 were due, he said, not to the Liberals but to the Conservative administration that had been defeated at the polls.

Betterment in Canada's Empire trade had been due to the Empire Agreements which had been criticized by the Liberals.

Under the 100 exemption on imports by tourists, if each brought back only \$20 worth that meant \$500,000 free imports.

Under his government, Mr. Bennett said, \$650,000 in bonds had been converted at a lower interest and "we were able to reduce the annual interest charge of this country by \$16,000,000."

Loans by his government to western provinces had been justified and had saved Canada's national credit, although loans should not continue beyond a certain point.

It had been unfair to Alberta to propose a loan council scheme which was not final.

The Liberal government should not ask the British parliament to amend the British America Act to permit retroactive legislation with respect to loan councils.

Establishment by the Conservative government of the Tariff Board had been denounced by the Liberals; now the board's findings were accepted without question.

The tariff of 1-2 per cent on agricultural implements in the Dunning budget was too low for the industry.

The proposed rebate of 50 per cent on some imported papers meant the Canadian taxpayers paid the other 50 per cent, which was unfair.

Countervailing tariffs on eggs, potatoes and cut flowers "represents the cowardice of an administration which is afraid to raise a duty."

"An eight per cent sales tax is a tax this country cannot bear. The capitalist system cannot bear it."

The Liberals had done nothing to remove the sugar tax.

There could be no loss on wheat until the supplies were liquidated ultimately.

The Canadian National Railways had a net loss of \$115,000,000 last year, but the Liberal government was doing nothing to solve this problem.
