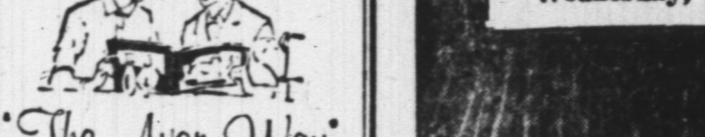

DUTCH DOUGHNUT TWISTS

(Crunners)
1. Measure into measuring cup ½ cup lukewarm water. Stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar. Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well.
2. Cream in a large bowl ½ cup shortening. Blend in ½ cup granulated sugar, ¼ teaspoon ground mace, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 well-beaten eggs. Add dissolved yeast, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1½ cups once-sifted all-purpose flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Work in an additional 1½ cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour.
3. Turn out on floured board; knead until elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top.
Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 ¼ hrs.
4. Punch down dough. Turn out on floured board; roll into an 8 x 12" rectangle. Cut dough into 24 strips, ½" wide and 8" long. Fold each strip in half; twist lightly and pinch ends together. Place on lightly-floured cookie sheets. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk—about ¾ hr. Deep fry in fat, heated to 375°; cook until golden, turning once. Drain on absorbent paper. Coat warm crullers with a mixture of ¾ cup granulated sugar and 1½ tsp. ground cinnamon. Yield — 2 doz.

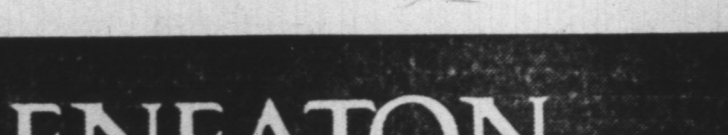
