JOSS HOUSE OPENED—A Chinese joss house has been opened in Montreal.

UNITED STATES GOLD—The gold holdings of the United States are now estimated at about \$1,600,000,000.

'T WAS NOT TRUE—The story sent out from Burlington, Vt., a few days ago, regarding the crucifixion of a woman named Du'ulv, turns out to be untrue.

COMMITTED SUICIDE—Mourning constantly for his dead wife, Daniel Shaver, a farmer, near Brantford, hanged himself on Friday, the fourth anniversary of her death.

FOR MISSIONARY WORK—The Baptist convention at Toronto last week passed a resolution recommending the churches to raise \$150,000 in the next eighteen months for general missionary work.

DEALING WITH LEPERS—A Victoria, B. C., despatch says: Numerous instances have been proven of Japanese and Chinese visiting D'Arcy Island Lazaretto and eating vegetables and other products of the lepers, which are sold here. There is grave danger of the spread of the plague among the whites in consequence.

A DISASTROUS TORNADO—A tornado swept over Lincoln, Ill., recently, coming from the southwest and covering a territory 150 yards wide and extending ten miles in length. At Lawndale the Chicago and Alton depot and several other buildings were wrecked, but no loss of life is reported.

LOST IN THE FOG—The Halifax Herald says: The City of Ghent, which arrived Saturday, brought two American fishermen from Canso, who were for two days in a dory without food or water, and who finally succeeded in reaching Sable Island, where they were looked after for several days and then provided with the requisites to enable them to make the mainland.

KANSAS JUSTICE—A story is going the rounds of the western papers to the effect that a justice of the peace in Kansas recently presided at the "hearing" of the corpse of a man who had been found drowned with a revolver on his person and \$50 in his pocket. The justice fined the corpse \$50 for carrying a concealed deadly weapon, and took the money.

THE KING—The big fight between Bob Fitzsimmons and Jim Jeffries, to take place at Coney Island, on June 9, is attracting considerable attention in ring circles. Jeffries' backers are getting more confident as the date for the battle approaches, and where the odds were once 3 to 1 on the champion, even money is now being wagered in a few cases on the result. And in no case will the betting men backing Fitzsimmons offer more than 2 to 1.

AN ORTHODOX EDITOR—Generally speaking, the Leader does not approve of newspapers making pathetic appeals through their columns to their delinquent subscribers and patrons, but when the exchequer contains 1 of the price of a postage stamp, the paper is the only medium by which the ear of the sinful delinquent can be reached. If there is no sinner, there should be one, for the accommodation of delinquent subscribers.—Parrsboro Leader.

MOTHER AND CHILDREN DEAD—Mrs. Johanna Schilling, 35 years of age, and her two young daughters, Gertrude, aged ten, and Edna, aged eight, were found dead on Sunday afternoon at their home at 305 east 84th street, New York. All had been asphyxiated by gas, doubtless turned on by the mother with the idea of murdering her two children and then committing suicide. The tragedy evidently grew out of a quarrel between the woman and her husband, Otto Schilling, a tailor.

MANY INDIANS DROWNED

While Crossing the Lake of the Clouds in Canoes.

LAGGAN, Alberta, June 3, via Seattle.—Between 25 and 30 Indians, including men, women and children, were drowned in the Lake of Clouds, near the Canadian Pacific Railway, which crosses the reservation, coming to a "potlach." They were travelling in boats rudely manufactured of caribou skins when the long boats collided. Both vessels were rendered useless and the entire party was lost. A third vessel, bearing skins of deer, bear, caribou, mountain sheep and goats, and manned by four Indians, reached the spot as the last survivor slipped from the capized boat and disappeared in the glacier-fan waters of the lake. Dense clouds were resting over the surface of the lake and were responsible for the accident.
