## New Pope Is Affable But Determined, Paper Claims

VATICAN CITY (AP) — "He has a very affable but determined character."  
That was the way the Vatican newspaper described Pope John XXIII when he became a cardinal in 1953, and the description holds true today.  
The new Pope often has been described as a jovial prelate. But he has never hesitated to make his views known, even when they might be unpopular.  
He once said:  
"Gambling to begin with is a most grave disorder in itself and deplorable, and to be condemned wherever it may be practised, even if in secret."  
NO SCANTIES FOR HIM  
Another time he reacted to the scantily clad foreign tourists visiting his archdiocese of Venice, and commented acidly:  
"People need not come to Italy in furs or woollens. They can come dressed in that modern American silk, fresh and soft, which is a veritable refrigerator at low costs."  
"Italy, on the other hand, is not on the equator, and even there, by the way, lions wear their coats and crocodiles are lined with their most precious hides."  
He was born Nov. 25, 1881, at Soito Il Monte, in the province of Bergamo, a centre studied with churches 30 miles northeast of Milan.  
WAS FARMING FAMILY  
His was a family of modest farmers.  
Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was 11 when he entered the diocese seminary at Bergamo. Twelve years later, Aug. 10, 1904, he was ordained a priest in Rome's Santa Maria in Monte Church.  
He celebrated his first mass over what is regarded as the tomb of St. Peter.  
The qualifications of the young priest were immediately obvious to his bishop, Msgr. Radini-Tedeschi of Bergamo, and Father Roncalli became the personal secretary of the prelate in 1905.  
He held this post until the bishop died in 1914.  
It gave the future pope an early knowledge of the administrative structure of the Roman Catholic Church. It also gave him a chance to gain experience as a teacher, at the Bergamo Seminary, in ecclesiastical history.  
JOINED ARMY  
The first World War interrupted his ecclesiastical career briefly. He first served as a sergeant in the medical corps of the Italian army. By the time the war ended

### Superb Production Of King Lear Seen In City Auditorium

The undaunted patrons of the arts who last night braved the inclemency of the continuing bad weather and betook themselves to Queen Charlotte High School auditorium to attend the second consecutive performance here by the Earle Grey players, were rewarded richly for their efforts.  
The Toronto Company's production of Shakespeare's famous tragedy "King Lear" was superb in every particular. In the title role Mr. Grey performed brilliantly, portraying vividly each of the aging monarch's many moods — his pride, his anger, his gentleness, his madness, and his remorse.  
Excellent performances were also turned in by each of the chief supporting players: Jan Kemp in the role of the aging Earl of Gloucester; Douglas Kerr in the role of the devoted Duke of Kent; John Douglas Campbell as the vacillating Duke of Albany; Robert Walker as the wicked Duke of Cornwall; Godfrey Jackman as the equally wicked Edmund; Gloucester's illegitimate son; Roger Fleming as Edgar, Gloucester's heir; Peter Sturgess as the Court Jester; and Mary Godwin, Liane Garon and Helene Gilbert as the King's three daughters, the callous and contemptuous Goneril and Regan, and the gentle Cordelia.  
Others in the cast were Ray Reno, as Oswald, steward of the Goneril; Dermot Grice as the King of France; David Burton as the Duke of Burgundy; Mary Barton as a Page, and Nicholas Dewey as a Captain.  
Set in Ancient Britain, the story evaluates from the aged King's foolish decision to divide his kingdom between his two eldest daughters, disinheriting the youngest because she refuses to flatter his vanity.  
Once they are in power, his daughters quickly show their true natures and treat the old man with ever-growing contempt, casting him out at length to fare for himself in the midst of a great tempest, accompanied only by his faithful Fool.  
This unexpected behaviour of his children drives Lear to madness, from which he is rescued by his still-loving third daughter, but in the end his enemies triumph. In the end his faithful daughter is murdered, and he, himself, expires as well.

### Ch'town K. Of C. Council Discusses Aid To Springhill

The "Good of the Order" meeting of the Charlottetown Council, Knights of Columbus was held in the home on Water St., Sunday evening, Oct. 26, under the chairmanship of Lecturer J.J. Meisac.  
A feature of the meeting was a letter by Rev. Vincent Mur-naghan, of St. Dunstan's University, on the origin and nature of the so-called "Social Problem" or "Social Question". Starting off from the position that modern society is disorganized and incoherent because of an exaggeration of individualism, he briefly traced the forces and movements in recent centuries which have contributed to the breakdown of social and economic life.  
A lively discussion by members followed this talk. Such current problems as chronic unemployment, housing conditions, and inadequate wages were discussed in the light of Fr. Murnaghan's talk. A vote of thanks to

the speaker was moved by P.G.K. Urban McQuaid, seconded by Bro. Noel Wilson.  
Grand Knight, Wilfred Driscoll, reported that he had been in contact with fellow members of the Order in Springhill on the morning after the "bump" was first experienced, and offered the aid of Ch'town members. He was happy to report that several dozen members had already contacted him offering suggestions and assistance.  
A general discussion took place as to the best means of contributing aid. It was generally agreed that the members as individuals and as a group should contribute to the relief fund, as well as offering additional prayers, and enrolling deceased members in confraternities among other suggestions.  
It was also planned to have a delegation of members attend the Memorial Service in Springhill next month.

### Anglican Bishop Davis Visits Island Parishes

Right Rev. W. W. Davis, co-adjutor Bishop of Nova Scotia arrived on the Island Monday to make his first official visit to several of the Anglican churches. Bishop Davis was conducting a mission in Springhill at the time of the recent mine disaster and before coming to the Island, visited the 18 Anglican Church family homes there suffering bereavement.  
The Island visitations opened at St. John's Church, Milton last night where the service was conducted by the Rector Rev. A. E. Pierrey with Bishop Davis delivering the sermon. There was a large attendance.  
The Rite of Confirmation will be administered to a class of young people prepared by the Rector Rev. M. J. Finlay at St. James' Church, Port Hill on Thursday morning.  
In the same parish the new church, St. Andrew, located at Inverness, will be consecrated by Bishop Davis, also on Thursday morning. This service will be attended by the Island clergy, and will be followed by a Quiet

Hour for the clergy, conducted by the Bishop.  
At Port Hill there will be a Deaconry meeting during the afternoon. Bishop Davis will preach at a service in St. Peter's Church, Alberton at 6:45 p.m. on Thursday and at St. Luke's at O'Leary at 8:00 p.m.  
On Friday Bishop Davis will preach at St. John's Church, Crapaud, in the Crapaud-Springfield Parish where the service will be conducted by the Rector, Rev. David Minton.  
The Rite of Confirmation followed by first communion will be administered by the Bishop at a service in St. John's Church, St. Eleanor's at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday and at the 11 o'clock service in St. Mary's Church, Summerside, conducted by Ven. Archdeacon Harrison. Bishop Davis will preach the sermon.  
Confirmations will be administered at St. Stephen's Church, Burlington at 2:30 p.m.
