CRONJE EXPOSED.

DEAR SIR,—In a recent number of the Guardian an item appeared stating "that the bridge on the new road between Valleyfield and Whim Road Cross was badly damaged by the flood of Friday, 16th ult.," also stating that "a dam further up the river was carried away,"—thus leading the public to believe that an extraordinary strain was put upon this grand structure. Through the columns of your valuable paper I would like to give a bit of the history of the new road and bridge. The road was first located here against the wish expressed at a public meeting of a large majority of the electors of the adjoining settlements. Supervisor McDonald and a few of his followers alone supporting it. Half the right of way of the Valleyfield end was purchased from this officer; half the right of way of the Whim Road cross was purchased from his brother. The work of opening the road was begun on the day before the last election, and crowds of electors could be seen marching from this boudle road to the poll on election day, and every man voted Grit, of course.

The main arm of the Montague river crosses this "new road," and tenders were called for the construction of a bridge. The tender of John Lemon was the lowest, and as he was an honest contractor, noted for his good workmanship and his knowledge of bridge building, his tender would naturally be accepted. But another brother of this notorious supervisor whose land was a little too far away to give him a share in the right-of-way stepped in and paid Mr. Lemon a snug sum for the privilege of becoming the contractor himself. He at once began the building of the new bridge, with his brother the supervisor as inspector, hired man, etc. The frames were bolted to the sand and pebbles and pieces of rock instead of on proper mudsills as in all other bridges of this kind, the consequence was that when the floods arose the sand and pebbles were washed away and the stones rolled and the side caved in, and the whole structure would have been carried away were it not that the span-beams were caught in the frost. This gave the Supervisor another chance of feeding the faithful. That the flood was not so remarkably strong in evidence by the fact that small temporary farmers' bridges a few hundred yards above the new bridge did not budge. So much for grit management of public works.
