It would appear from the above that the M.C.A. team are the best hitters and the worst fielders in the league. The Abbie Intermediates who lead the league by a wide margin are the class of the circuit, defensively, and pretty well up there in hitting too. If you except Holman's, it would seem that Junior players are not doing so well with the hickory as their elder brothers. The Holman team are footing the poll in batting, but actually their present line-up are more potent batters than this would indicate. Holman's experimented a lot this year with inexperienced players, and some of them were pretty hopeless in the batter's box, but they've settled down to a group of regulars now, and they look to be stronger than either of the two junior clubs.

The R.C.A.F. are perhaps the best balanced club, placing second in both batting and fielding. They seem to be getting stronger as the season progresses, for two reasons. Their old standbys who started slow this year are showing steady improvement, and when a man leaves the station and a new player comes in, the exchange generally seems to be a help to the club. This new boy, Lundell, looked good Monday, both at the bat and in the field. Barton, the colored boy, has been a very valuable addition to the team.

The reason for the C & B boys not living up to their reputation as Island champs, and Island League winners of 1952 shows up pretty well in the batting and fielding averages. They're fourth in hitting, and fifth in fielding. The youngsters looked to be a very promising club last year, considering their very low average. They are all a year older now, but have not come along as expected. Young Dee Lefuray, who started the season as the third string pitcher to the two Boston imports, was somewhat disappointing as a hurler, but he has been lambasting the ball so regularly that Johnny Curlew plays him regularly in the outfield. Johnny Whalen has been getting his base hits fairly often, but outside of those two boys, the club has been woefully weak with the stick.
