DEATH OF MR. R. B. McAULAY.

It is with profound regret that we are called upon to record the death of Mr. Ronald B. McAulay, a highly respected and worthy resident of Tracadie Cross, Lot 36. The deceased had been in delicate health for some time previous to his death, yet early in the spring thoughts of his recovery were entertained. But notwithstanding the best medical attendance the dearest expectations were shattered by the reappearance of that fatal trouble—heart disease—and at 5 o'clock a.m., May 29th, surrounded by his sorrowing friends, he yielded up his last sigh edifying those who were about him by his piety and resignation and peacefully passed from this world to his eternal reward at the age of 63 years. Oh death did we not behold it gathering gradually but irresistibly over limb and feature reducing them to stiffness, rigid as marble and silent as the grave until at last it sat enthroned upon his manly forehead like a shadow of eternity. That which no skill can ward, nor strength resist which no entreaties can stay or turn aside has claimed its victim, falling upon him not by surprise, however, but self possessed as he ever was in life, and prepared to meet it. Mr. McAulay was honest, upright, sober and industrious, a useful member of the community, ever ready to assist in all charitable and enterprising purposes. He has indeed ended a truly moral and model life, and his death is a full enjoyment of life has caused a space deeply regretted by all classes. He had the consolation of being frequently attended during his illness by his devoted pastor, Rev. P. J. Hogan, and died strongly fortified by the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church, of which he was a worthy and persistent member. His friends have the satisfaction of knowing that everything that could be done for one leaving this world was done for him. On Wednesday morning an unusually large and representative concourse of people followed his remains to the new church at Tracadie, where a solemn Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated by the pastor. After the impressive office for the dead was solemnly rendered, his remains were borne to the adjoining cemetery and laid in their last resting place. He leaves one brother and five sisters, and a large circle of friends to mourn their irreparable loss.

FINGER-PRINT TESTS.

The Method Discussed in Novels of Identifying Criminals.

In detective novels finger-prints left by criminals, preferably in blood, play an important part; but the truth seems stranger than fiction is the fact that the finger-print system of identifying criminals in India has been made so perfect that it would enable any intelligent person in a few minutes to distinguish the individual, if necessary, from all other persons now living in the world, or, if data were available, from all other persons who have lived since the creation of man. The system is simplicity itself, and there is none of the elaboration of process of the costly and delicate machinery required for the anthropometric system. All that is needed is a piece of tin, a sheet of paper and some printer's ink. The ink impressions of the ten digits are taken and filed in the proper compartment of the proper pigeon-hole, and this on the classification of records and their distribution into the pigeonholes that the success of the system depends.

Every finger mark shows lines of the "loop" or the "whorl" type, and by a simple table of the combination of these types in the ten digits 1,024 main classes are made. These are again subdivided, according to minor details, and the subdivision can be further divided, ad infinitum if necessary; but with the table before him any person of ordinary intelligence can place his finger on the corresponding card to a record in his hand within five minutes, no matter how many thousand cards there may be. It is calculated that the chances are about 64,000,000 to 1 against any two persons having single fingers identical and the chances against all ten fingers being identical go beyond mathematics altogether.
