The meeting closed by repeating the Benediction. Mrs. Arnold Smith invited the members for the next meeting.

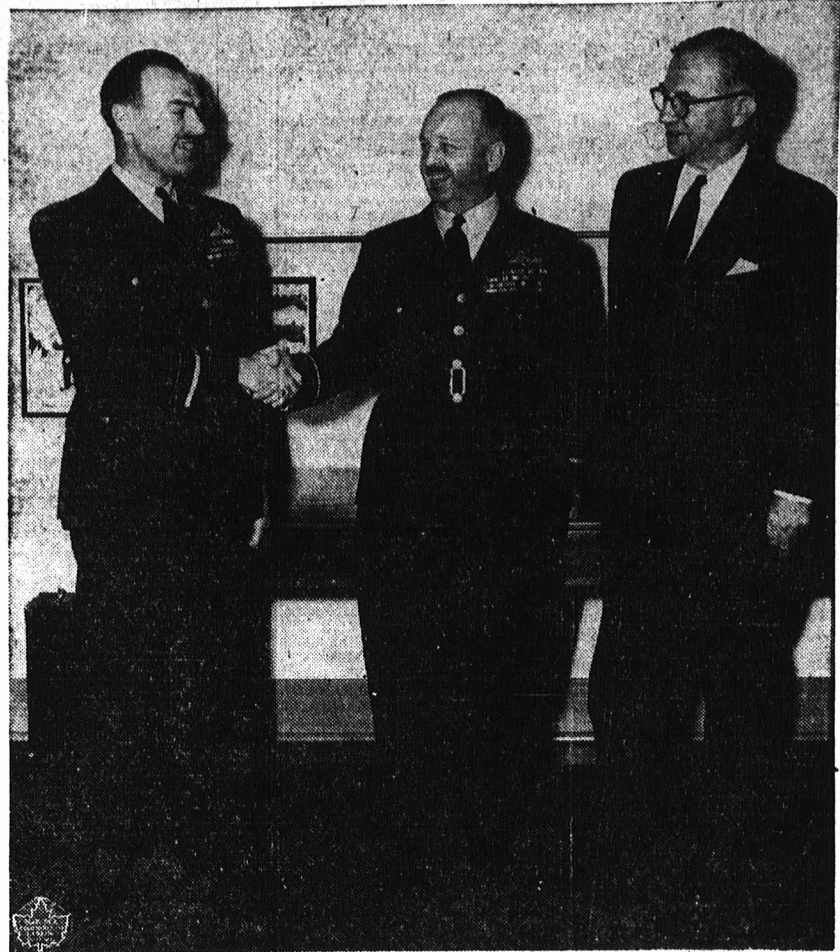

## Air Chief To Retire

A/M Curtis, under whose guidance the post-war R.C.A.F. has emerged as one of the world's leading air forces, was appointed Chief of the Air Staff in September 1947 after serving as Deputy Commander-in-Chief of R.C.A.F. forces overseas and Air Member for Air Staff at Headquarters in Ottawa. A/V.M. Slemmon held senior appointments in the R.C.A.F.'s No. 6 Bomber Group and R.C.A.F. Headquarters overseas during the Second World War and then became Air Member for Supply and Organization at AFHQ. In 1947, he became Air Member for Operations and Training and in 1949 was appointed Air Officer Commanding, Training Command, in which capacity he has been responsible for the success of the greatly expanded R.C.A.F. training programme.
