The Sponsor Unique So-Ed Group

SUMMERSIDE — Guest speaker for last night's weekly meeting of the So-Ed group across Canada was Ronald Marsh, president of the National Social Education Committee of Canada.

Mr. Marsh, who was introduced by Duane Mollins, gave a very informative talk on the activities of So-Ed groups across Canada. He stated that the local So-Ed group is the only one in Canada that is sponsored by a club or organization, making it unique in that respect.

In describing the growth of the So-Ed National executive, Mr. Marsh said that it is very closely allied with the National office of the YMCA and is staffed mainly with young men and women in order to channel their thinking toward activities which are in line with young Canada.

He also outlined the growth of the So-Ed movement across

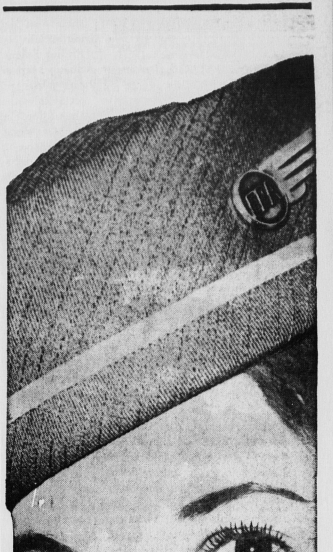
Minstrel Show Is Success In Souris

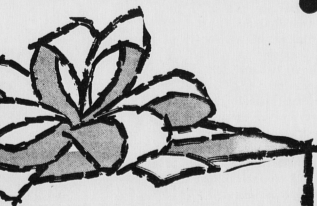

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says late Thursday evening cloud hung over the northern part of the forecast district, but variable amounts of clouds were being reported elsewhere. Campbell reported a few isolated showers earlier this evening.

Cooler air, from Northern Quebec, pushed southward into northern New Brunswick; Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton, and is expected to remain there overnight, accompanied by cloudy skies and widely scattered showers. However, early today the very warm air covering the southern part of the district, is expected to sweep northward again, giving a sunny and very warm day to most of the district.
