

Johnny Kalmuck Takes New Record In Feature Event At Local Meet

Walter Kelly's big Johnny Kalmuck and the Claude O'Brien driven Abbeland divided the Free For All honors between them last night as they highlighted the racing meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park with their stirring track battles.

Johnny Kalmuck set a new record of 2:10 1-5 as he paced his way to the top in the first race of the event. His old mark was 2:11. Abbeland, the betting favorite in the first race went into an early lead at the starting gate and held this lead until the stretch. Johnny Kalmuck moved up from third position to battle it out in the stretch and pass Abbeland about 50 yards from the wire.

In the second race it was the Quebec owned horse all the way. O'Brien took Abbeland away from fifth position and raced into an early lead which he never surrendered. Johnny Kalmuck moved up again to challenge in the stretch but the big bay gelding moved out too late.

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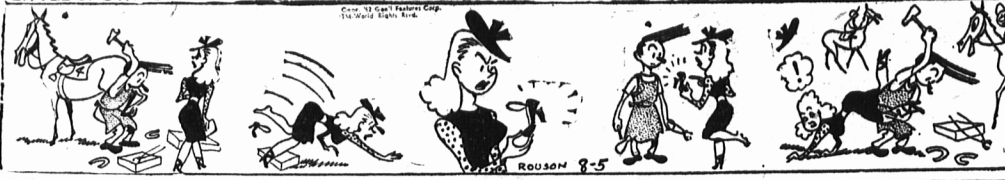

DArtmouth, N.S. — (CP) — Roy Morrison, easy-swinging shot-maker from Moncton, N.B., today fired a two-over-par 70 to lead a field of 125 in qualifying play for the Maritime golf championships.

From the field, 32 will play for the title until Thursday. That went to teen-age Lea Windsor of Halifax, who walked away with the junior crown, posting a 72 and 71 to win by a wide margin over a field of 14.

Lorne Perry, also from Halifax's Ashburn Club, was second with a total of 160. A three-way tie for the leadership of the professional division existed after one round. Pete Shymko, Truro; Kas Zabowski, Halifax, and Bob Sandow, New Glasgow, all fired 71's.

The amateurs begin play Tuesday. In posting his 70, Morrison shot a 36 on the first nine and came home with a par 34. Former Nova Scotia champ Rex Joudry was second in medal play, taking a 71 on his home course.

Russians Out To Win Next Olympic Games

MOSCOW, Aug. 4 — (AP) — The Russians are going to the next Olympic Games in Australia determined to beat the United States and every other country in men's track and field events and swimming. They have a good chance of doing it.

Anyone living here knows with what zeal they are going to throw themselves into the task. Four years ago the central committee of the Communist Party set two goals—to win world championships and set world records in all major sports. Much has been accomplished by Soviet athletes since that time. The biggest thing, of course, was their participation in their first Olympics. And according to their calculations, they won it unqualifiedly.

Three Records Are Broken At Post-Olympic Meet

Sunshine Dairy Defeat Bombers

LONDON, Aug. 4 — (CP) — Three world records were broken, another was equalled and other times went by the boards today in the traditional post-Olympic invitation meet between the United States and the British Empire. The Americans won it, but the cheers went to the Australian girls.

More than 50,000 spectators crammed into White City Stadium to see athletes from the Helsinki games show their stuff on a rain-soaked track. A lure was the women's 400-metre relay and amended were made for the disastrous baton-dropping incident at Helsinki by the east Australia the Olympic title and gave it to the U.S.

The Aussies made no mistake this time. They ran the Americans into the ground, won by at least a world record time of 46.3 seconds. Canada was fourth with 48.0 in the five-team event.

Canada was represented at today's meet, and that's the best that can be said of her athletes. Jack Ross of Oakville, Ont., and Vancouver's Jack Hutchins were on the British Empire's team that finished a feeble second to the U.S. in the rarely-run two-mile relay.

Bill Parnell, also Vancouver, anchored the British Empire four-mile relay team and he just didn't have it against John Barnes in the last leg. Parnell led by almost 18 yards with 400 yards remaining and he was beaten to the tape by about five yards when Barnes put on the pressure.

World records were broken in the two-mile relay, and in the women's 440-yard and 880-yard relays. The U.S. team chalked up 7:29.9 to win the two-mile. Australia took the women's 440 in the record-smashing time of 46.3 seconds. Canadian discus thrower Roy Pella of Sudbury, Ont., ranked fourth in the discus throw with a heave of 153 feet 1 1/2 inches. Winner was James Dillon of the U.S. with 173-7 1/2.

Musial, Fain Lead Batting In Major Leagues

NEW YORK, Aug. 4 — (AP) — Stan Musial of St. Louis Cardinals, who captured the National League batting crown by an 11-point margin last season, may have an easier time taking the title this year.

Musial now enjoys an 18-point lead over his closest competitor, Toby Atwell, Chicago Cubs catcher. By pouncing on 13 hits last week the Cards' slugger increased his average to .334. Atwell tailed off four points to .316.

In the American League, 1951 champion Ferris Fain of Philadelphia Athletics zoomed ahead of Boston's Billy Goodman by adding 13 points to .345. Goodman, tied with Fain for the top spot last week, fell to third place behind teammate George Kell, as he lost 10 points to .323. Kell picked up seven points to hold second with .323.

Bob Addis, Chicago outfielder, occupies the National League's third position with a .312 mark. Hank Sauer of Chicago's Cubs continues the leader in home runs with 27 and runs-batted-in with 87.

Larry Doby, Cleveland outfielder, and New York catcher Yogi Berra are tied for the American League home-run lead with 23 apiece. Brooklyn's Preacher Roe, although he lost his first game of the season Friday, is still the top National League percentage pitcher with seven victories and one defeat. Sandy Consuegra of Washington is the A.L.'s leading hurler on a percentage basis with five triumphs and no setbacks, but Bobby Shantz' record is even more impressive. The Philadelphia left-hander has won 19 and lost three.

FISHING CAPTAIN DIES
MALDEN, Mass., Aug. 4 — (CP) — A Boston fishing Captain, William J. Forbes, 86, died here Saturday.

Born at Woods Harbour, N.B., he leaves 157 descendants. He went to sea as a cabin boy in 1875, after coming to Boston from Nova Scotia. He obtained his captain's license when he was 21. Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Ethel Titus of Westport, N.S. Charlottetown.
