Harvey Moore's Humane Sanctuary Work Goes On

Well, the first big fishing contest of the season ends Monday. I'm talking about the angling for votes that's been going on for the last month or so.

While this column remains firmly non-partisan, it's still our hope that somewhere among the 30 candidates is one who has a liking for the pleasures to be found with field and stream, and might be willing to champion a cause or two.

If he exists he is one candidate we most certainly would like to see elected. Otherwise, there is just a day or two left for hunters and fishermen to sound out their local candidates as to their feelings about mat-

ters of concern in the outdoors area.

The Harvey Moore Wildlife Fund has presented its annual scholarship at the Prince of Wales College graduating exercises, and at about the same time was enriched by a new donation to the scholarship fund.

The fund was set up in 1961 by friends of the late naturalist Harvey Moore of Milltown Cross, and no better picture of Mr. Moore's dedication to the cause of conservation could be found than the citation in the Declaration of Trust.

It reads: "An unpretentious man of modest means, in 1950 he established on his own premises at Milltown Cross and at his own expense maintained, with only minor assistance, a water-fowl sanctuary—a haven of rest, safety and timely assistance for thousands of wild ducks, Canada geese and other birds."

"He so inspired them with trust in him, and confidence in his protection, that many would come directly to him at his call, even in the presence of others nearby, and not a few would press forward to be handled and voice appreciation of his kindly attention."

"He did not seek publicity, and his outstanding services became known only gradually to residents of the province and casual visitors."

thousands of birds who visit the sanctuary and some who make the pond a year round home.

I've asked many people about Moore's uncanny way with wild animals, and haven't yet been able to discover just how he went about instilling that kind of confidence in the birds. I guess it's a matter of communication that escapes logical definition, but there was no mistaking it in his lifetime.

Mrs. Moore, though she does not approach her husband's ability, nonetheless gets along pretty well with her guests herself. I recall visiting the sanctuary several years ago to prepare a radio broadcast and she put the birds through their paces for me.

"We walked out to the edge of the bank, with me carrying a tape recorder and Mrs. Moore a bucket of feed. She began calling... 'Come On... Come On... Come On...' and in a twinkling I was treated to one of the most unusual sights I have ever seen.

As one, the flock of several hundred ducks turned at sound of her voice and began half swimming and half flying across the pond. They numbered up the bank waddling along like so many overweight supply sergeants and literally scrambled over our feet in an effort to get at the grain being scattered around.

I did an interview with Mrs. Moore with the cackling quacking sound of feeding ducks for a background symphony, and it was later broadcast.

I never will forget the experience, but I have a confession to make. In all honesty I kept see-

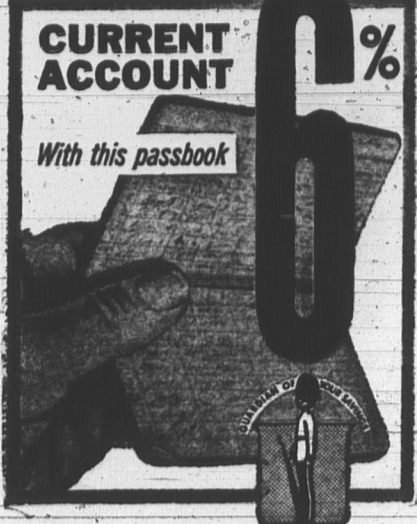

Meanwhile an anonymous donor has given the fund \$500.00. The donor knew Harvey Moore well, and was a great admirer of his work.

In making the gift the donor stressed the great need for more conservation work to be carried out in the province, and the hope he expressed that the Harvey Moore Scholarship might encourage efforts in that direction.

The trustees of the fund have asked me to express their gratitude to the donor through this column, and may I add my own heartfelt vote of thanks.

In making the gift the donor offered the hope that his gift might inspire others interested in the welfare of wildlife to make additional donations to the fund.

Amen to that sentiment. It would indeed be a long step forward if the fund could be built to the point where it might carry a good deal of the financial load in adequately training wildlife experts for work in the province.
