per cent increase in wages as of July 1, 1953, and a five-day week effective January 1, 1954. Permission to take the strike vote had been granted at a special meeting of the Provincial Cabinet held September 21 with the terms and time to be fixed by the Provincial Secretary. Shortly after Premier A. W. Matheron stated that one week after the vote the result was to be certified to the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council and to officers of the trade union. He further added at that time "any strike action then taken earlier than 15 days after this procedure will be deemed to be unlawful." Later the Telephone Company released a letter from the Public Utilities Commission in which the suggestion of a possibility of a request from the company for a rate increase if the findings of the arbitration board were implemented. It added that in this event the Commission might be compelled to decide as to the prudence of such increase in operating costs. However, the union maintained that the company should have accepted the decision of the arbitration board and put it into practice. Then they could go to the Commission if they could show it was hurting them.

Britain Will

The report, prepared by a committee appointed by the government last April, said that the government believed "that the most rapid and economical development in this field will be secured by transferring responsibility from the ministry of supply to a non-departmental organization with the necessary executive power within the framework of an approved policy and under a financial ceiling to settle day to day problems. "It believes that the necessary flexibility and speed of decision can best be obtained from the board of an organization run on industrial lines and with no responsibility outside the field of atomic energy."

act, make a down payment or pay the high costs for building materials.
Revolving Fund
The Legion suggested that the government set up a revolving fund under the VLA to provide a veteran with initial capital to start building. Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation could later take over financing of the home. Some 6,000 houses have been built by veterans on small holdings under a VLA Build Your Own Home scheme based on construction courses given prospective builders during the winter when the actual building starts. The Legion urged that this plan be extended to veterans wanting to build in the city. A qualified veteran would be given loans from the government's revolving fund to pay the sub-contractor or supplier of materials. Building plans would have to be approved by VLA and construction carried out under its supervision. The completed house would be sold to the veteran who built it with VLA taking back a mortgage. "We believe that this is a sound, practical approach to the problem of veterans' housing with very little actual financial outlay on the part of the government," the Legion brief said.

Offers Incentive

The new corporation will be able to attract outstanding scientists with a pay-scale comparable favorably with that paid by industry. Scientists have complained in the past that salaries offered by the ministry of supply have been woefully insufficient to attract top men. Among organizations to be transferred to the corporation will be the atomic energy research establishment at Harwell, which includes a radio-chemical centre for the production of radio-active substances - radium, radon and isotopes - for medical, scientific and industrial purposes. Another is the establishment at Aldermaston, where research work on atomic weapons is carried out.

Fishermen Hold Meeting At Alberton South

The first area meeting of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Association in Prince County was held last evening at Alberton South with the secretary of the Association, Mr. C. F. Richards presiding. Mr. Cyrus Poirier of the Extension Dept. St. Dunstan's University was also present. Mr. Richards, in his opening address said he was very much concerned with the problems of the fishermen and urged those engaged in the industry to organize in order to speak with greater authority when recommending improvements affecting fishermen. He also urged a greater membership in the organization and Myrie Matthews was appointed to arrange for payment of dues, etc. Conservation of lobsters was discussed at some length and a number of fishermen expressed the opinion that if the spawn lobsters were returned to the water lobster fishing would not decrease to any extent, regardless of the size limit. The opinion of those present was that the recently inaugurated fishermen's loan plan and trap insurance was practically useless to fishermen. A resolution was drawn up to be presented at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Association strongly urging that the first range lights at Alberton harbour entrance be changed from white to green and raised about 20 feet higher than the present lights. Reasons given were that the present lights were obscured by sand hills and were being confused with street lights of the same colour. The matter of a government freezer for bait was also discussed. The appointment of delegates to the annual convention on Dec. 7th at Charlottetown was left for a future meeting.

Impressive Ceremonies Scheduled For Today

At Memorial Square in Summerside today impressive ceremonies will mark the occasion in memory of the fallen heroes of two world wars. As in former years, the parade will fall in on Fitzroy Street, opposite the Armouries at 10:35 and proceed via Spring Street to Memorial Square. The parade will be in command of W/C H. A. Forbes, D.F.C., and Major G. L. Monkley, the World War Two group and veterans of the Korean War. The representative mother, this year, will be Mrs. William R. Mann. At Memorial Square, after O Canada, the ceremonies will be opened by Charles Hogan, president of the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.L., and followed by a reading, also by president Charles Hogan. The prayer will be offered by F/Lt. R. P. Condon and the address will be delivered by His Worship, Mayor Henry W. Wedge. At the conclusion of the ceremonies at Memorial Square the parade will move off and proceed up Spring to Notre Dame Street, the middle of the battlefield.

about the national anthem and the flag laid down that only the Ceylonese flag and national anthem "Namo Namo Matha" will be used on official occasions. The reason for the change was announced as: "Since Queen Elizabeth has been proclaimed Queen of Ceylon there is no need for a second flag or anthem." The proclamation issued from Buckingham Palace last May 23 announced the Queen's royal title as: "Elizabeth II, Queen of Ceylon and of her other realms and territories, head of the Commonwealth." Ceylon became a fully self-governing member of the British Commonwealth Feb. 4, 1948, recognizing Elizabeth as Queen. Lord Soubhaya was appointed governor-general July 6, 1949, when Don Stephen Senanayake was prime minister. Kotelawala became prime minister last month, after Dudley Senanayake, son of the previous premier, resigned for health reasons.

means that they will be pressed for speedy ratification of the European army treaty. Paris reports indicate that Laniel and Bidault will go to the conference with their own demands, notably for Western support. If France decides to sound out the chance of an armistice with the Communist in Indo-China. But any pressure with regard to the European army would come at an awkward time for the French statesmen. Most French politicians have been hoping to put off a definite decision until after France's presidential election Dec. 17. A debate on the European army is scheduled in the French assembly Nov. 17, and there is to be a meeting of the six countries who must ratify the army pact at The Hague Nov. 28. There were rumors in Paris that the French might seek to postpone both the assembly debate and the Hague meeting.

ground by German shelling - except a tiny area around the cathedral. Not only was the land mixed to a hopeless putty with the under layer of chalk blasted up, but the soil itself was burned in to lifelessness by the blazing powder of millions of artillery shells. The French fired more than 12,000 shells in the long battle and the Germans must have fired at least as many. When I came, a heavy mist covered the hills along the Meuse. The only dry spot seemed to be that long grim strip called the "Trench of Bayonnet" where French and German soldiers were at hand combat when the artillery fire caused the rain-sodden walls of the trench to fall together, burying them upright, the barrels and bayonets of their rifles sticking from the ground. There they remain.

Stand By Contracts

Dulles' statement by Dulles that the Big Three would meet to take decisions over Germany independent of Russia is taken by some officials here to mean that the U.S. would urge the granting of near-sovereignty to West Germany before the European army treaty is ratified. This would give Germany benefits she is due to receive under the Bonn Contracts. The contracts, signed 18 months ago, are due to come into force at the same time as the European Defence Community. Foreign office officials again emphasized Wednesday that British policy is to stand by the original schedule on the contracts, but they admitted that Churchill's speech Monday night might mean that he would not be sympathetic to any such American proposal. The Prime Minister went out of his way to stress his conviction that it was important to bring Germany back quickly into "the world family of free nations." Konrad Adenauer, West German chancellor, is known to favor giving early effect to the Bonn Contracts over the faring EDC plan is finally approved by the six member countries.

list and member for York-Humber; and Mrs. Ann Shipley, 53-year-old reeve of Teck township and member for Temiskaming who will be the only woman on the Liberal side. These are the new women in the Senate: Mrs. Nancy Hodges, 65-year-old Victoria journalist; Mrs. Muriel McQueen Ferguson, 54-year-old deputy mayor of Fredericton; and Mrs. Marianna Beauchamp Jodoin, 71-year-old Montclair widow. All are Liberals. Senator Hodges and Miss Aitken are both newspaper columnists. For the last 12 years, Miss Aitken has written a daily column for the Toronto Telegram. Mrs. Hodges writes a widely-read column, "One Woman's Day," for the Victoria Daily Times. She has had long experience in B. C. politics and was elected to the legislature in 1941, 1945, 1949 and 1952. She was the first woman in British Commonwealth to serve as speaker of a legislative body. Mrs. Shipley has had much experience in municipal politics. She worked for 10 years for the Ontario Department of Lands before moving to Kirkland Lake in 1923. She is the only Ontario mayor or reeve to be president of both the Ontario Municipal Association and the Ontario Mayors and Reeves Association. Two Lawyers Senator Ferguson and Miss Bennett are both lawyers. Miss Bennett is partner in a Georgetown, Ont. firm in a prosperous farming area northwest of Toronto. Long active for the Progressive Conservatives, she heads the women's association of the party and is a vice-president of the Ontario Progressive Conservative Association. Mrs. Ferguson trained in law under her father, the late James McQueen, in New Brunswick. She practised law from 1935 to 1943 and served as enforcement counsel for the wartime prices and trade board until 1947. Since 1947, she has been regional welfare administrator for the federal health department at Fredericton. She was the first woman elected to the Fredericton city council on which she has served since 1961. She is deputy mayor of the city. Mrs. Jodoin has been active for the Liberal party in Quebec for 27 years. She is Quebec president of the National Federation of Liberal Women and the first French-speaking woman to be appointed to the upper chamber from that province. She is active also in charitable and religious work in Montreal where she makes her home.
