CANADIANS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Reports Received at Ottawa.

TROOPS STANDING WORK WELL

Heavy Marching Under Trying Circumstances.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—Further reports were received at the Militia Department last evening from the different contingents in South Africa up to August 12th. The effective strength of the infantry on that date was 548, which shows an improvement over the last report. Two hundred and seventeen men were sick.

Col. Otter states that no mail had been received from Canada for upwards of three weeks.

After leaving Springs the battalion joined General Ridley's mounted infantry, which were operating against Dewet. On August 19th the battalion joined General Hart's brigade of infantry which included the Northumberlands, Somersets, Derbyshires and Dublins.

Dewet was marching northward and the infantry pegged after him, going eleven miles one day and fifteen miles another under trying circumstances,—the wind blowing a gale and throwing up clouds of dust.

Col. Otter says that the men he has with him are standing the work very well.

The first battalion of mounted rifles was at Bruikfontein Aug. 16th, its effective strength being 171 out of a total of 368.

The second battalion of mounted rifles was at Pan Station Aug 8th, its effective strength being 166 out of 373.

ACCIDENT AT SEA.

The Corinthian Disabled for Sixteen Hours.

QUEBEC, Sept. 18th.—The Allan line steamer Corinthian was disabled on Thursday morning last when nearing the Strait of Belle Isle, by the rudder chain breaking at the stern post. After a delay of sixteen hours the damage was repaired, and the vessel was able to proceed.

McDonald Again!

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 16.—The military authorities have taken over the Netherlands railway.

General McDonald, operating in the northeastern corner of Orange Colony, compelled the Boers to make a hasty flight from the Vet Rives. He captured thirty-one wagons, a quantity of cattle and stores, and 65,000 rounds of rifle ammunition.

FROM CHINA

Terrible Accident to a Fatigue Party

SIXTEEN KILLED: TWENTY-TWO INJURED

While Engaged in Destroying Gun Powder They Were Themselves Destroyed

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The British commander at Pekin cables that a fatigue party engaged in destroying gunpowder at Tung Chau had been blown up.

Eleven Welsh Fusiliers were wounded, Two British Indian soldiers were killed, and 13 British Indian soldiers were wounded and Captain Hill and 13 British Chinese infantry soldiers were wounded.

Later advices show that 16 were killed and 22 injured in the explosion.

Boers Clamoring.

MACHADODORP, Sept. 16.—The supplies of the Boers have been exhausted. The troops have not been paid and are clamoring for their wages in gold.

High Prices in Johannesburg.

JOHANNESBURG, Sept. 16.—Gold is selling at famine prices, bringing two shillings and six pence a pound and pork the same price. Matches are sold at one shilling per box. Other staple articles are proportionately dear, while many necessities are not obtainable at any price.
