W. Currie, past president of the P. E. I. Liberal Association. Mr. Edson Rayner, president of the East Prince Liberal Association also addressed the gathering briefly.

Candidate speakers were Mr. Morley M. Bell, Q.C., Summerside, Hon. E. P. Foley, Summerside, Hon. C. C. Baker, Kensington, Hon. George MacKay, Albany, Mr. J. A. Gallant, Summerside and Mr. Frank MacNutt, Malpeque. In his address the Premier stated that he would not make promises that he couldn't keep or that would not be beneficial to Prince Edward Island in general. He also reviewed the record of the Liberal Party during the past recent years.

Fisheries Board Scholarships

OTTAWA (CP) — The fisheries research board, in an effort to reduce a shortage of fisheries scientists in Canada, has instituted a scholarship program similar to that of the National Research Council. Announcing Thursday 12 awards totalling \$12,500 for 1955-56, the board said they are limited to post-graduate study at Canadian universities but it is hoped eventually to offer them for training outside Canada.

Conservative Rally Held At Kensington

A Progressive Conservative Party rally for the Third and Fourth Districts of Prince and the First District of Queen's was held last night at King George Hall, Kensington, and was attended by more than 300 persons. Mr. Thomas Wigmore of Kensington was the chairman.

Speakers included the Progressive Conservative candidates from all three districts, Messrs. Douglas Crossman, Albany, Keith Boswell, Victoria, Frank Myers, Hampton, Walter G. MacKenzie, Springfield and Charlottetown, James Hickey, Darnley, and Cyrus P. Gallant, Ezmont Bay. In addition Mr. R. R. Bell, the party leader, spoke and Prof. Heath MacQuarrie, of Brandon, Man., briefly.

Mr. Bell said his party platform was being announced Saturday. He said it wasn't announced earlier because he didn't want the Liberals to "steal or borrow it."

He discussed a number of questions, including rural electrification, highways and health and welfare. Concerning rural electrification he said the Liberals had a promise to electrify the province years ago and the whole program should have been completed long ago. And last year, he said, 102 miles of lines were built, not the 138 the Liberals claimed.

The Liberal government has been in power 20 years and the highways were still in poor condition in many places. They had had time to have the program much further advanced.
