DOMINION ALLIANCE

Temperance Liberals Condemn Sir Wilfrid

At a meeting of the Executive of the Quebec Branch of the Dominion Alliance, Sir Wilfrid's declaration that the smallness of the majority in favor of prohibition did not warrant the Government in introducing a prohibitory measure was warmly denounced as an utterance unworthy of a statesman who had definitely promised to introduce prohibitory legislation, if, after a vote had been taken on the subject, it was found that a majority of the people of Canada were in favour of such. Surprise was expressed that the Premier should have so completely repudiated his pre-election promises, and it was very evident from the general tenor of the letters, that their writers had lost the confidence they had hitherto reposed in Sir Wilfrid and the members of his Government. That his action was condemned by all fair-minded temperance workers was certain. A number of the letters read came from well known Liberals in various parts of the Province. These writers did not hesitate to call Laurier stinging names. One of the writers, a man who has been a Liberal all his life, and who is said to be a personal friend of the Premier's, was especially severe in his condemnation of Sir Wilfrid. He said that he had always had a great respect for the Government leader; that he had always regarded him as a man who would not descend to political trickery; that he had always looked upon him as a man of integrity, principle and honor; one who would scorn to imitate the methods and practices of the degenerate politician. He felt bound to confess, however, that his idol had been shattered, and that Laurier was, after all, very much like the ordinary politician of the present day—a man who would sacrifice integrity to the exigencies of party politics, and to love of office.

The following resolutions were adopted:

"That the Quebec Executive of the Dominion Alliance has learned with deep regret of the decision of the Premier to refuse to grant the mandate of the Canadian people as expressed in the recent plebiscite, to abolish the manufacture, importation and sale of liquors.

"The interpretation put by the Premier upon the plebiscite we consider manifestly erroneous. From the assurance given by the Premier in Parliament and elsewhere we had a right to expect that a majority of electors voting in the plebiscite would be accepted as an expression of the will of the people, in this instance as all others.

"That we do not regard this decision as final, there is yet an appeal to the people's representatives in Parliament, a large number of whose constituencies have declared in favor of prohibition.

"Therefore, be it resolved that we recommend the Council of the Alliance to secure the introduction in Parliament of a resolution declaring in favour of prohibition, and endeavour to secure a vote which shall be free from political party influence and if the Parliament accepts such a resolution and it is carried, the Government be asked to introduce such legislation.

"We declare it to be the purpose of this Alliance, and the duty of every temperance elector to use every loyal means available to defeat any member voting against such resolution and to elect any who shall vote in its favour.

"That temperance electors shall take immediate steps to interview their federal representatives and secure their promise to support the prohibitory resolution, in the present session; when personal interviews cannot be had, letters should be sent to the members at Ottawa urging such action. Churches and other bodies favorable to prohibition are requested to take similar action."

Another question discussed by the Executive had reference to the alleged wholesale stuffing of ballot boxes in this province, by returning officers, during the recent plebiscite vote. Mr. Carson said that the Alliance was in possession of certain facts connected with such which showed that a scandalous condition of affairs had existed. Corroborative evidence would be obtained, and then the Government would be asked to take definite action in the matter, with a view of punishing those who had been guilty of corruptible practice.
