The following telegram was received from S. Thane Belyea, Fredericton, N.B. Wednesday night: "Dr. G. C. McCoy passed away very suddenly this morning." The late Dr. McCoy was well known to horsemen throughout the Maritimes and Maine. It was for many years in charge of the race track at Fredericton and also the accommodation for horsemen and was very popular with them. He had studied veterinary medicine, was a competent practitioner, but in 1918 he received an appointment with the government and we understand gave up practice.

The Fredericton track under his careful superintendence was the fastest in the Maritimes and possibly the fastest half-mile strip in Canada. Evidence of that is the pacing record made there by Walter Dale 2:00 on Sept. 15, 1937 of 2:02 1/2, and the Maritime trotting record of 2:07 made by Peter Poley 2:06 1/2, Sept. 13, 1934. Dr. McCoy was one of the first Directors elected to the United States Trotting Association and occupied that position for several years. He was much esteemed by everyone who knew him and our sympathy and that of horsemen friends throughout the Maritimes will go out to his family.
