

Saints Earn Right To Meet P.W.C.-S'side Winner By Upsetting Abbies 6-2

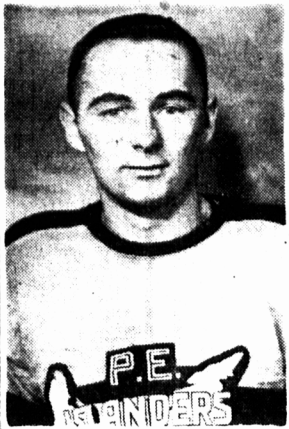
A fast skating, smooth passing band of Saint Dunstan's Collegians last night defeated their more experienced rivals, the Charlottetown Abbies, 6-2 in a sudden-death, semi-final City League hockey match at the Forum. The win gives the Saints the right to meet the winner of the P.W.C.-Summerside series for the City League championship.

Clever goal tending by Gillis in the College net was one of the factors in Saint Dunstan's win but Heustis in the Abbie goal was equally adept and it was mostly on breakaways that he was beaten. Willie Dunn of the Abbies, who played outstanding hockey for the losers, was in on Gillis several times in the first period but was robbed by the agile college netminder.

The Saints rapped in three unanswered goals in the first period, split a pair in the second and out-scored the Abbies 2-1 in the third. Only three penalties were handed out by referees Kennedy and Richard Gaudet of Saint Dunstan's got the nod in the second for cross checking and Coyle and MacInnis were chased for roughing in the third.

The Islanders return home today after their longest road trip of the season. Most of the team has been away for more than a week with the exception of a few hours last Friday night and Saturday morning. The players went to Halifax yesterday evening and returned Friday night and left Saturday morning for Glace Bay. Only one carload reached the Bay and the others returned from Port Hawkesbury to spend the week-end in New Glasgow. After playing in New Glasgow on Monday night they moved to Glace Bay for last night's game. They will be home tonight for a double game stand against the league leading Atlantics.

The Islanders defeated Sydney Millionaires in New Glasgow on Monday in overtime. It was the Islanders third win over the Moneyemen in the last four games and it looks as though the Trainormen have the Indian Sign on their Sydney opponents. The Millionaires are losing their battle for first place solely because of their inability to beat the Islanders in those important games. And the Islanders probably want it that way. They have a very impressive record against Halifax for the league schedule and feel that they will knock the Atlantics out in the first round of the play-offs.

The Islanders almost came up with their first win of the season on Glace Bay ice last night. They were playing without the services of team captain Gus Gustavson who suffered a hip injury in New Glasgow on Monday. Gustavson's injury is not believed serious and it is expected that Gus will be back in the lineup this week, probably tonight. Judging by their recent games the Islanders are starting to hit their stride and it may be that they will hit the play-offs in top form.

As we see it the Islanders are going into the play-offs this year in better condition than at any time since their first year in the Big Four. During the past two years they hit the play-offs following a winning streak and were due for a let-up. This time they appear to have come out of a slump and will be in a winning mood when they face the Atlantics in the nine game semi-final series. Dick Irvin of the Montreal Canadiens used to claim that hockey players could only go at top speed for the same length of time as a pigeon. Pigeons evidently fly all-out for three weeks and then must let up. Three weeks at top speed for the Islanders in the play-offs and they may be looking for new worlds to conquer. Fellows like Claude Robert and Paul Saindon, who can score goals at a fast clip, haven't been playing their best hockey in recent weeks. They are coming back into their own now and will be dangerous men in the play-offs.

The delegates at the Maritime Major Hockey League meeting on Sunday didn't show mercy on the Islanders when they slapped a \$650 fine on the local team. The \$650 fine was the balance due Glace Bay for the postponed January 16th game. The Islanders had earlier paid \$500 and had agreed to re-play the game in Glace Bay. Unfortunately they were unable to get to the Bay on account of travel conditions so Glace Bay demanded the extra money. The failure of the Miners to get here last Friday and the subsequent inability of the Islanders to reach Glace Bay on Saturday cancelled each other as far as fines were concerned.

It is still our belief that the Atlantics could have arrived here by train had they made the necessary arrangements on time. Atlantics Clinch First Place In M.M.H.L. With 7-4 Win Over Sydney

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics clinched first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday night by downing Sydney Millionaires 7-4 in a game that saw Atlantics' Bill Ford score three goals.

They were the first points Ford has scored since he broke the 128-point league scoring record 10 days ago. Bob Bowness also notched three goals for Atlantics and the other went to Ross Watson.

In the standings, the win put Halifax two games ahead of Mils. Halifax had a two-goal lead within the first minute, on goals by Ford, and Bowness added two more before the period ended. Watson made it 5-0 early in the second but Sydney exploded for three quick goals before Ford scored his third to make it 6-3.

Sydney's scorers were Lorne Pirie, with two, Roger Dubuc and Gordie Cowan.

In the third, the spotlight was on Roy McMeekin, pudgy Atlantics' netminder who allowed only one goal in handling 18 shots. All

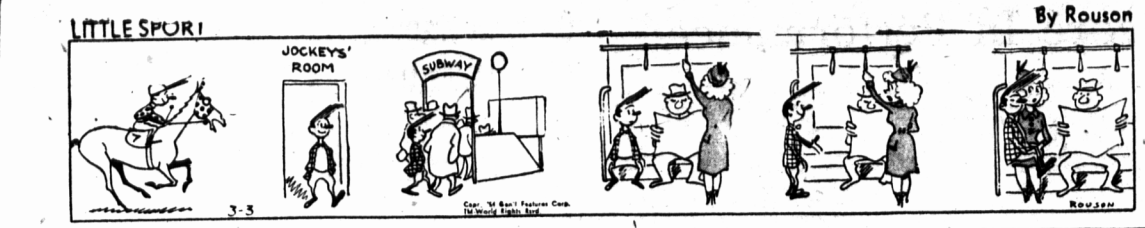

Rochford's Hat Trick Gives Glace Bay Miners 4-3 Victory Over Islanders

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—A hat trick by Kevin Rochford gave Glace Bay Miners a 4-3 win over Charlottetown Islanders in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Tuesday night.

The win gave Glace Bay a six-point lead over the cellar-dwelling Charlottetown. Halifax Atlantics defeated Sydney Millionaires 7-4 to take a four-point lead over Mils, who are nine points ahead of Glace Bay.

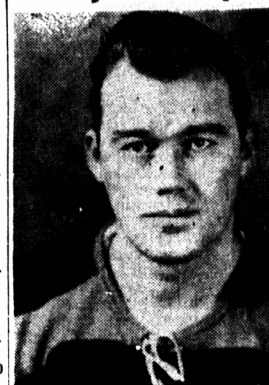

Swedish Press Apologizes To Canadian Hockeyists

STOCKHOLM, (CP)—The Swedish press made its apologies to Toronto East York Tuesday, a week after describing the team as the worst ever sent abroad by Canada in international hockey competition.

Commenting on the Canadians' 6-0 drubbing of Sweden's defending champions Monday in the world hockey tournament, one sports writer said:
"We can be grateful that Canada sent over her worst team."
The Canadians, unbeaten in three games in the eight-team round-robin series, were idle Tuesday as Russia's Moscow Dynamos took over first place by defeating Czechoslovakia 5-2. The Russians, newcomers to international competition, have a 4-0 record while Sweden and Czechoslovakia have lost once in four tries.
