FATHER O'LEARY.

A Splendid Reception at Quebec.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

QUEBEC, Oct. 6.—Rev. Father O'Leary was accorded a magnificent reception on his arrival here.

The reverend gentleman says that when Cronje surrendered he counted sixteen white flags in the laager. The Boers had no respect for the white flag, and moreover had frequently fired on stretcher-bearers and ambulances.

He speaks in the highest terms of the Revs. Almond and Fullerton, the two other chaplains, and remarked that they were splendid companions. They were both disappointed at being unable to accompany the regiment in the engagement at Paardeberg, but strict orders had been received from Kitchener that no chaplain nor correspondent was to accompany the column. Father O'Leary protested, and subsequently orders were received that Father O'Leary only was to accompany the column.

The Sunday following the battle of Paardeberg, accompanied by a detachment of troops, Father O'Leary went to the battlefield and arranged the graves of his dead comrades, placing a cross on each with the name and number of the deceased. He had all the Canadians buried separately from the other victims, so that if any measures are ever taken to bring their bodies back to Canada there would be no difficulty in doing so.

Brief speeches were made by Mr. Theophilus Gallant and P. G. Stens, after which the meeting closed with hearty cheers for Sir Charles Tupper, Senator Ferguson, and the popular candidate for King's, —A. C. McDonald.
