

Young Adults Hold Area Rally Here Yesterday

The need for fellowship groups within the church was stressed yesterday by Rev. J. Elton Davidge Sackville, convener of Christian Education of the Maritime Conference of the United Church at an area rally held at Trinity Church in Charlottetown.

In addition to the Irwin Christian Fellowship Group there were representatives from Souris, Cra-paud and Kensington. The meeting opened in the afternoon with scripture reading by Rev. Howard Christie and prayer by Russell Ewing.

Rev. Donald Sharpe of Souris gave an interesting report on the National Conference for Young Adults which took place last summer at Whitby, Ontario.

Mr. Davidge in the afternoon dealt with the subject of organization. He said that groups such as those participating in yesterday's rally were an important factor in the life of the Church and in the lives of the individuals concerned. He also pointed out that in most organizations the tendency was to draw husband and wife apart but in couples' groups there was a move toward bringing them together.

A lively discussion followed the speakers remarks and the matter of dealing with newly married couples within the church was given considerable attention. It was felt that many of these couples had graduated from the Young Peoples Groups and now found themselves without the fellowship that they had previously enjoyed. The importance of organizing a group that would take care of those in this category was getting younger couples interested given emphasis and it developed that the main factor required in was personal contact.

Call Tenders To Prepare For Ice Plant In S'ide

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening approved a resolution which will transfer the ownership of the Raceway Stadium to the town of Summerside, and at the same time called for tenders for groundwork which would be preparatory to the installation of an artificial ice plant.

It had been expected that a contract for the installation of the artificial ice plant would be awarded last evening but a further delay on this matter was explained by Mayor Henry W. Wedge who said that one of the councillors could not be contacted to inform him of the meeting, and the Mayor indicated that another councillor was absent because of a disagreement on the agenda of the meeting, and as a result it would be necessary to call another special meeting which would be done as soon as possible — presumably Monday or Tuesday.

He indicated that the matter of the ice plant contract would be dealt with by the council at that time.

Three Dead In Spectacular Port Blaze

Three persons were killed in a spectacular fire which broke out in a warehouse on the waterfront of Charlottetown Tuesday night to wipe out this river port six miles west of Birmingham.

Gasoline fumes exploded, throwing flames more than 100 feet high, but three men risked their lives to turn on valves leading into huge gasoline storage tanks and the blaze was brought under control.

Dead were Felton Thrasher, 46, plant superintendent for the Triangle Refineries, Inc.; his daughter, Tina May, 20, and Olen K. Doad, 23.

Thrasher died in hospital Thursday. Bodies of the other two, missing since the blaze began, were found in the debris.

No estimate of the damage was available. The blaze began when escaping gasoline fumes came into the Thrasher apartment. An explosion rocked the apartment above the Triangle offices, and spread quickly to the loading docks nearby.

Test Capacity To Benefit From Advanced Education

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN CHICAGO (AP) — Would you declare boldly and without fear of successful contradiction that, "to sympathize is to be filled with grief?"

Or would it be a more accurate and logical approach to reason that, "to overflow is to be filled with water?"

Or, "to envy is to be filled with hatred."

Or, "to shiver is to be filled with horror."

Or, "to yearn is to be filled with longing."

If you picked the last suggestion and your brain works that way most of the time, you'd stand a good chance of breezing through the recent college scholarship test put on for the brightest high school seniors by the U.S. Merit Scholarship Corp.

Nearly 60,000 of the most promising seniors took the test in 10,000 high schools throughout the U.S. Oct. 26. The 4,000 highest scorers will qualify for second exams Jan. 14 which will lead the scholars into next year for the 350 winners.

The competing students were required to answer 115 questions in the two-hour examination. The test was devised not to learn how much the students know, but to measure their scholastic aptitude — the ability to benefit from advanced education.

Although the winners will not be determined for several weeks, the sponsors released a few typical questions posed in the test.

Some of the test questions, with answers at the bottom, follow:

Test 1. In the area of word relationships, rift is to cloud as (a) schism is to church, (b) segregation is to division, (c) articulation is to fission, (d) dispersion is to insularity or (e) severance is to confluence.

Test 2. Regina is to revolution as (a) function is to incapacity, (b) quarrel-agreement, (c) employer-union, (d) generalization-exception, (e) terrain-earthquake.

Doctors, Surgeons Top Money Earners In Canada

OTTAWA (CP)—Medical doctors and surgeons in 1953 replaced consulting engineers and architects as Canada's top money earners—and taxpayers.

Nurses remained at the bottom of the heap, earning an average annual income of \$1,157 lower than that of Canadians on pensions.

A 145-page revenue department tax analysis called the "green book" issued Wednesday also shows that the average income of Canadians in 1953 rose to \$3,383 from \$3,228 the previous year.

Average income of medical doctors and surgeons jumped to \$11,258 in the 1953 tax year from \$10,522 in 1952. Their average tax bill rose to \$2,572 from \$2,518.

LAWYERS COME SECOND

Lawyers and notaries retained third place with average income rising to \$9,955 from \$9,222 and the average tax to \$2,280 from \$2,125.

Accountants were fourth with an average income of \$8,095. The tables disclosed that the

number of Canadians earning less than \$1,000 a year rose to 4,836 in 1953 from 4,693 the previous year. The number earning between \$1,000 and \$1,500 increased to 3,295 from 2,965, but those earning between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 dropped to 361 from 364. Those receiving over \$5,000,000 increased from 73 to 75.

"This clinic," Mr. Roberts said, "would help drivers get straightened away before they lose the right to drive for all time."

He also said he is in favor of introducing a point system which would stop the right to drive should persons have a given number of infractions listed against them.
