

Yankees, Dodgers Split Week-End Games

Yankees Bomb Dodgers 11-7 In Wild Slugfest Sunday To Regain Lead

(By Jack Hand) BROOKLYN. (AP) Mickey Mantle, switching madly from hero to goat and back again, hit a crushing grand slam home run off reliever Russ Meyer's first pitch Sunday as New York Yankees bombed Brooklyn Dodgers 11-7 in a wild slugfest to regain the world series lead, three games to two.

Needing only one more victory to clinch an unprecedented fifth straight championship, the Yankees came home to Yankee Stadium for today's sixth game and seventh, if necessary.

Jim McDonald, manager Casey Stengel's starter yielded 11 Dodger singles before Billy Cox's three-run homer in the eighth knocked him out. Lefty Roz Kuz's and finally Allie Reynolds, with his aching back, were needed to make sure the Dodgers were dead for the day.

Six Home Runs

Six home runs sailed through the summery air to tie a series record set by the Yankees and Chicago Cubs, Oct. 1, 1932. The Yanks' total of four was only one short of their own mark, hung up by the 1928 "murderers' row" against St. Louis Cardinals.

The two clubs collected 25 hits, good for 47 bases.

The blow Mantle hit off Meyer, who had just replaced 21-year-old Johnny Podres, stunned the big Sunday crowd of 36,775, exactly the same number that set a Brooklyn series record Saturday. The Dodgers never were able to recover their balance although they thrashed around violently in the eighth and ninth.

Mantle's homer topped a clus-

ter of five unearned runs in the third, an inning that let the air out of Dodger hopes for a clean sweep in their home park.

A vital error by Gil Hodges on Joe Collins' smash off first base put the Yankees in position for their big third inning. The error let Phil Rizzuto score from second and put starter Podres in a tough hole.

The southpaw hit Hank Bauer on the right wrist and walked Yogi Berra on a 3-1 pitch to fill the bases. Manager Chuck Dressen decided to call Meyer, the hot tempered ex-Philadelphia Phillis righthander.

Russ strode in to face Mantle, four times a strikeout victim of Carl Erskine in Friday's game. Mantle rode the first pitch high into the upper stands in left about 300 feet away.

Everybody predicted this would be a free-hitting game when Podres and McDonald, two pitchers with ordinary records and late season flops, were named to start. This game just happened to catch both managers without a real top-flight starter.

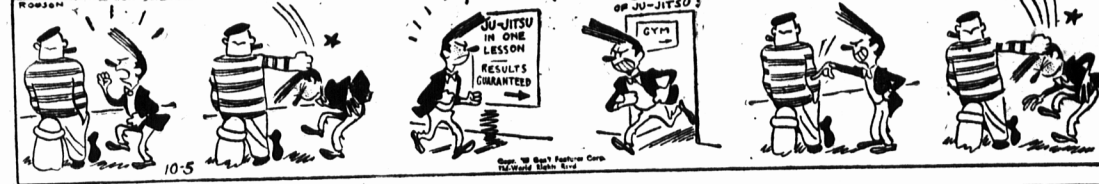
First Time Since 1909

Gene Woodling slammed Podres' fourth pitch into the center-field seats, a 395-foot poke, leading off for the Yanks. It was the first time a series player had opened up with a homer since Detroit's Davey Jones in 1909.

Brooklyn had McDonald on the ropes in the third when he was lucky to escape with only one run on singles by Roy Campanella and Gil Hodges and a wild throw by Phil Rizzuto on Carl

MONTREAL. (CP) — Big Jean Beliveau, hockey's prize rookie who exudes personality and color, finally made up his mind Saturday and came into the fold of Montreal Canadiens.

The 22-year-old centre-ice star signed a five-year contract. The figure wasn't disclosed, but managing director Frank Selke, beaming happily, said "it is the highest contract ever given any player—highest by a city block."

U. S. Retains Ryder Cup

VIRGINIA WATER. (AP)—The United States Ryder Cup team retained the famed international golf trophy Saturday, but only after a bitter struggle with a determined British squad which almost regained the cup after 20 years.

The U. S. won the cup outright when Dave Douglas of Newark, Del., and Bernard Hunt of England finished all square in their 36-hole match. That left the final score 6 1-2 points for the U. S., and 5 1-2 for Britain. That was the score in 1933, when England last won the cup.

Jim Turnesa of Briarcliff, N. Y., turned the tide when he came in with a 1 up victory over Britain's Peter Allis shortly after the U. S. team captain, Lloyd Mangrum, and Sam Snead had gone down to defeat.

Mt. A. Comes From Behind To Defeat S. D. U. 7-6 In Intercollegiate Opener

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Mount Allison University scored twice in the final 20 minutes of play Saturday to defeat St. Dunstan's of Charlottetown 7-6 in the opening game of intercollegiate rugby.

The Mounties were trailing as the game neared an end but a try by Mousse MacLennan and a kick by Les Davies gave them the win.

Lloyd Gaudet, flashy performer for the Saints, registered both tries scored by his team, breaking through the Mt. A. line on the right wing and crossing over standing up on both occasions.

Les Davies made the convert for a 35-foot kick, his second of the game. The ball cut the uprights in dead centre, three feet above the bar.

N.H.L. All-Stars In 3-1 Victory Over Canadiens

By W. R. Wheatley (Canadian Press Staff Writer) MONTREAL. (CP) — The National Hockey League all-stars, capitalizing swiftly on manpower advantage in the first period, defeated Montreal Canadiens, Stanley Cup champions, 3-1 Saturday night in the NHL's seventh annual all-star game.

Little Wally Hergesheimer of New York Rangers fired two goals in the opening period, enough to win for the all-stars who were outshot 31-20 but were given magnificent support in the nets by the brilliant Terry Sawchuk of Detroit Red Wings.

Maurice (Rocket) Richard scored for Canadiens in the last period, rapping in the rebound of a smacking shot by Jean Beliveau, Canadiens' rookie sensation who signed his contract earlier in the day. The all-stars were a man short when Richard counted.

Gerry McNeil, who can't be blamed for the defeat, was pulled from Canadiens' net in the last minute by coach Dick Irvin when the champions staged a desperate offensive, and Alex Delvecchio of Detroit scored the final all-star goal in an open net.

The game set a record for both crowds. Attendance and gross receipts. The crowd of 14,422 eclipsed the previous best all-star game attendance of 14,169 in 1947 at Toronto. The gross gate was \$30,386.75. The best previous was \$25,920.75 in 1949, also at Toronto.

Despite the summer-like heat, the game seldom lagged and the teams played it to the hilt. The 11 penalties called by referee Red

Mangrum, 2 up, and a short while later in the see-saw singles battle, Britain's long ball hitter, Harry Weetman, eked out a 1 up victory over Snead.
