one of the warehouses will be built in the Toronto area, the other in Quebec City. The buildings will be of steel and cement. Construction is to begin within the next few months.

Gives Details Mr. Brophy made these points: 1. Defence orders placed since just prior to the Korean war total \$4,000,000,000. The original plan was to develop a three-year rearmament program. Since then, the government has taken on new commitments and the program likely will take about four or five years to complete. It will cost more than the \$5,000,000,000 originally anticipated.

2. Most of the orders were placed in Canada. About \$500,000,000 worth, one-eighth of the total, was placed in the United States. In turn the U.S. placed \$400,000,000 in Canada.

3. So far, the government has paid out \$2,800,000,000 to cover bills on actual arms deliveries. With the defence program "levelling out," Canada has to guard against allowing essential production to "dissipate" completely, leaving Canada in the same position as she was before Korea.

The wartime and present British prime minister decided to go to Moscow and see Stalin. Referring to textiles exported from United States into Canada, he said Mr. Abbott told him that under present regulations governing dumping of U. S. goods, none is entering Canada which can be prohibited.

In his message to Mr. Stuart, Mr. Gregg said Canada and Japan are engaged in negotiating a trade agreement consistent with the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, which is designed to place commercial relations between Canada and Japan on a stable and mutually advantageous basis.
