

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

TARIFF REFORM.—A meeting of all interested in tariff revision is called to meet the President and Committee of the Board of Trade in the City Council Chamber on Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

LOBSTERS FOR NEW YORK.—Three cars of lobsters from P. E. I., which were taken to the warehouse at the New York pier for shipment to New York by the steamer State of Texas, are being handled down to the warehouse of the I. S. S. company on account of the delay to the State of Texas.—St. John Sun.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—The marriage of Mr. Stephen T. Whitty and Miss Minnie Gallant, of Charlottetown, was solemnized at Boston on the 10th inst. FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer Eastnet, Capt. CREAK EXCURSIONS.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has arranged to run cheap "World's Fair" excursions from St. John and other points on their lines at single fare, going 27th and 28th July and returning from Chicago at any time until August 7th. This is said to be the cheapest rate to the World's Fair yet fixed in America for the distance travelled.

DETERMINED TO SUICIDE.—A clerk in the post office at Ottawa, named Walter Rowan, attempted suicide on Tuesday night while in a state of delirium. He threw himself down stairs twice, badly injuring his head. He took several bottles of spirits of ammonia; then hacked his thigh with a knife and made three gashes in his throat with a razor. He was found by a neighbor and sent to a hospital. It is expected that he will recover.

MARITIME MEDICAL ASSOCIATION.

Last Evening's Session—Excursion on the Harbor—Banquet at the Davies.

At the session of the Maritime Medical Association held last evening, Dr. Kelley read a paper dealing with a case of "Dilatation of the Stomach," and Dr. S. R. Jenkinson read a paper on "An Autopsy Appendicitis." Both papers were very interesting and instructive, and a profitable discussion followed their reading.

Before the session adjourned a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the President of the Association, Dr. James McLeod, of Charlottetown, for his invaluable services to the Association and for his cordial reception of the members.
