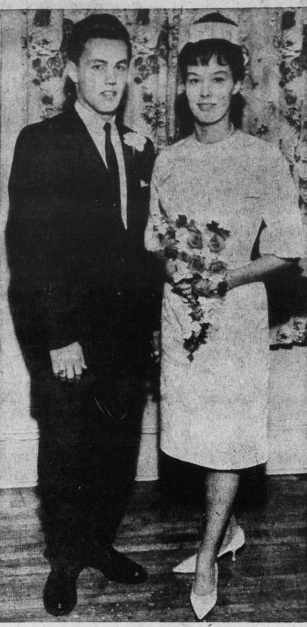

Gourmet Foods Can Add Interesting Note To Salad

REFRESHING chilled tossed salads can be gourmet foods within the income. They were invented by French epicures to serve at lengthy dinners between the entire and dessert.

Today we use simple tossed salads not only for this reason but because of their packed-nutritional values.

If the salad is to be dressed in advance and refrigerated, choose crisp iceberg lettuce. If to be tossed just before the meal, or table-side, loose-leafed Boston type lettuce has the right texture to absorb the dressing. For tossing at the Bibb lettuce tossed with very little dressing is epicurean; the rare and delicate limestone or Bibb lettuce tossed with very little dressing is epicurean.

In any case, the green salad is always tossed with plain, unseasoned French dressing consisting of 4 ingredients — 3 measures olive oil, 1 measure choice of wine or cider vinegar, salt and fresh ground black pepper to taste.

For fancy salads of mixed greens, cooked vegetables or mixtures of fish, the salad seasoning bases on sale in fancy food stores can add variety.

Build-up salads can be fashionable too, for buffets or for individual service in place of an hors d'oeuvre.

Choose individual wooden salad bowls, small at the bottom. Rub lightly with garlic. Place in the center a crisp, tall lettuce tower, stand against it a stalk or two of celery, tops on, or fennel with its feathery tips.
