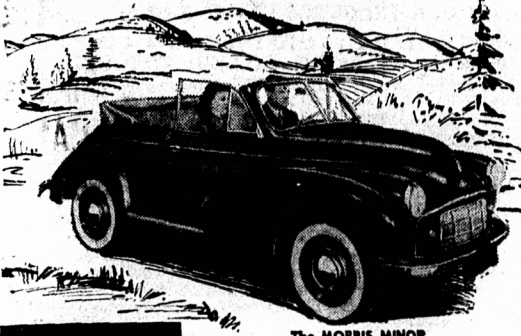

**George Bernard Shaw Is 94**

AYOT ST. LAWRENCE, Hertfordshire, England, July 27—(CP)—George Bernard Shaw, who says he has decayed into a dodderer, had a birthday yesterday—his 94th. He said no one was to remind him of it.

The old man did celebrate, though by announcing that he has written a new play called "The Lady She Would Not."

Shaw passed the day quietly in his home here. To his domestic staff he said: "No birthday is to be mentioned in this house."

To the mail man he snapped: "I want to see no birthday cards. They will all be thrown out on arrival."

To a reporter: "I thought something might be expected of me to mark my birthday, as usual, so I've written another play."

"I've labelled it 'a little comedy,' and called it 'The Lady She Would Not.' It is in five scenes. I wrote the whole thing in seven days. Yes, in seven days."

**Fleet Carrier Out Of Reserve**

LONDON, July 27—(Reuters)—The light fleet carrier Warrior will be transferred from reserve at Portsmouth and used to carry reinforcements to Royal Navy forces operating off Korea, it was announced today.

The 18,000-ton Warrior was commissioned in January, 1946, and served with the Royal Canadian Navy until 1948 when she returned to the Royal Navy and became an experimental and training vessel.

**Radio Artists As Witnesses**

MONTREAL, July 27—(CP)—Chief Justice Edouard Archambault's Criminal Court today took on the appearance of a night club when radio artists gave a free show of voice impersonations and mimicry.

They testified as defence witnesses at the trial of three provincial policemen accused of conspiring to commit bank holdups.

The defence contends that records made of alleged conversations supposed to incriminate the three were faked.

Charles-Emile Poliquin, who is charged with armed robbery, has claimed that the officers helped him plan a bank robbery at St. Hugues, Que., as a means of exacting a pay-off after he had been arrested for previous bank holdup at Ste. Genevieve de Batiscan.

Poliquin says he made the records secretly in his Montreal apartment and at a hotel suite in Three Rivers.

**Communist Paper Offers Apologies**

LONDON, July 27—(AP)—The Communist Daily Worker ate crow today for implying that a Russian atom spy who deserted to the west was an impostor trying to make propaganda against the Soviet Union.

The Daily Worker apologized in court in settlement of the Russian's libel action. It said its imputations were "without a vestige of foundation."

The Russian is Grigori Alexandrovich Tokaev, formerly a colonel in the Soviet air force. Tokaev sought asylum here more than two years ago.

**Retirement Of C.C.F. Chairman**

VANCOUVER, July 27—(CP)—Prof. F. R. Scott of Montreal, national chairman of the C. C. F., officially announced his retirement at the opening of the party's biennial convention.

**Potato Growers' Advisory Service**

(Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia)

Ideal conditions for the development and spread of potato late blight have been provided by the cool nights and warm humid days that have characterized the weather through July. So long as this type of weather prevails the fields will be in danger of infection. The growers are strongly advised to protect the plants by spraying at once.

Eggs of Colorado potato beetles are now hatching and young larvae are causing considerable damage. The first brood of flea beetles is about over and there should not be any other damage from these until the second week of August when the second brood appears. Aphids are building up rapidly in many fields. DDT should be applied along with the late blight spray immediately.

**"20,000 THIEVES"**

ALTONA, Australia—(CP)—Eric Lambert, 28-year-old veteran of North Africa and New Guinea, has been given a fellowship to write a novel entitled "Twenty Thousand Thieves." The title is the name given the Australian troops by William Joyce—Lord Haw-Haw. The book will be the story of the Australian campaigns in the near and middle east.

**Home Economists Annual Meeting**

The Prince Edward Island Home Economics Association had its annual meeting, Wednesday, July 26th, at the charming river-side home of the Vice-President, Mrs. Thane A. Campbell, in Stanley Bridge.

Routine business was transacted. The officers appointed for the coming year are: President, Miss Mary Robbin; Vice-President, Mrs. Thane A. Campbell; Secretary-Treasurer, Sister Frances Loyola. A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring president, Mrs. E. S. Coffin, M. B. E. Miss Sterns reported on contributions to the Violet Ryley-Kathleen Jeffs Memorial Foundation Fund.

Those present listened with much interest to reports from members who attended the joint convention of the Canadian Home Economics and Canadian Dietetic Associations held in Montreal early in July. Miss Margerie Hill gave an outline of the work done during the pre-convention course at McGill University; Miss Hazel Sterns and Sister Frances Loyola gave a resume of convention talks and description of other convention activities. These reports were presented briefly but in such a way as to give the audience a vivid picture of what went on at the Convention and of the general activities in the national field especially of recent advances in nutritional research in which Canadian scientists are taking a prominent part.

Among the guests, Miss Alberta McFarlane, past Educational Director for the American Restaurant Association, was warmly welcomed by old acquaintances. Her enumeration of some of the positions now offered to Home Economists showed how enlarged the professional field has become.

The problem was brought up of what could be done to improve tourist food service, now often a source of complaint. Miss McFarlane was able to offer helpful suggestions from her wide experience, and it is hoped some action will be taken to correct this situation so injurious to the desired tourist trade.

The ladies were delighted to spend a social hour enraptured by the loveliness surrounding the cottage-rock gardens with varied floral growth—encircling hills with rich natural scenery—the peaceful river flowing by—over all quiet and seclusion to rest the spirits. Tea was provided by the Summerside members of the association; Miss Martha McFarlane and Mrs. Garth Toombs poured and Mrs. Allison MacLean and Miss Ruby McNeil served. The thanks of all was cordially offered to the gracious hostess, Mrs. Thane A. Campbell, and to all who had assisted in making this a meeting long-to-be remembered.

**Former Leader Quits Party**

TORONTO, July 27—(CP)—Thomas Gerald (Gerry) McManus, 50, resigned today as secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Seaman's Union (Ind.) and announced he was quitting the Labor-Progressive (Communist) party because of its hands-off-Korea policy.

The one-time provincial leader of the Communist party in Saskatchewan said at a press conference that he could no longer support a party of an organization "that supports a war of aggression on the one hand and advocates world peace on the other."

RADWAY, Alta.—(CP)—What may be the oldest goose in Canada is living on the district farm of Anton Platz. Born in 1927, the goose, now blind and lame, has been a record producer for many years, averaging 30 to 35 young ones annually.

**1949 Canadian Co-Op Business Over One Billion**

OTTAWA, July 27 1950—Co-operative business in Canada is getting bigger with the years along with an increasing membership in cooperative organization. Total business last year exceeded a record one billion dollars, an increase of \$200,000,000 over 1948. Membership in cooperatives was up 60,668.

These are the highlights of the 18th annual summary of cooperative organizations in Canada, a study made each year by the Economics Division, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Mr. J. E. O'Meara, who supervises the work.

Points out that although only 65 per cent of all known Canadian cooperatives reported their 1949 operations, the chief organizations were all included, and it is estimated that 90 per cent of total

**business was reported.**

Cooperative sales of farm products made up \$783.3 million of the total; sales of merchandise, chiefly farm machinery, clothing and home furnishings, food, coal and wool amounted to \$191.8 million; sales of fish and fish products amounted to \$14 million; and sales of fishermen's supplies and merchandise totalled \$2.7 million. Miscellaneous items made up the remainder of this one billion dollar business.

It is calculated that during the twelve months to July 31, 1949, cooperatives marketed 32.9 per cent of the main farm products which were sold commercially. Of individual products, cooperatives sold 89.9 per cent of the tobacco; 79.9 per cent of the wool; 55.1 per cent of the grains; 27.5 per cent of the fruits and vegetables; 26.8 per cent of the maple products; 25.5 per cent of the dairy products; 18.4 per cent of the poultry and eggs; and 12.1 per cent of the

**honey.**

Each province reported an increase in cooperative sales of farm products. By volume of sales, Saskatchewan was first, Ontario second and Alberta third, but by percentage increase over 1948, New Brunswick took first place, with Manitoba second and Alberta third.

Merchandising cooperatives reported an increase of \$33.4 million over their sales in 1948. The increase was mainly in sales of farm machinery, food, coal and wood. But sales of feed and fertilizers, two supplies handled extensively by this kind of cooperative, were up 16 per cent from 1948 for a total of \$77 million.

The greatest number of fishermen's cooperatives is in the Maritimes and Quebec, but of the hundred reporting, the greatest volume of business was done by seven cooperative organizations in British Columbia which in 1949 marketed fish valued at \$9 million.

**Says Fighters Must Stay Here**

CHICAGO, July 27—(AP)—Don H. Murdoch of Winnipeg, president-elect of Kiwanis International, said today "Canada fighter planes must be kept in Canada to guard against any possible Russian attack via Alaska and the Northwest Territories."

**British Navy Holds Exercises**

LONDON, July 27—(Reuters)—British naval units today began exercises off the northwest coast of Scotland. The exercises, one of six held during the year, consisted of anti-submarine and convoy attack operations.
