PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

THURSDAY, April 27

House met at 11

Mr. Campbell asked the Leader of the Government if he had received a resolution from the inhabitants of Centre Line Road, and the residents of Hope River, passed at a public meeting condemning the action of the supervisor of that district in changing the location of Centre Line Road and asking to have the old route restored; if so, what action the Government intend to take in the matter.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said he had received such resolution, and had written to the supervisor that the old road was not to be closed until the new one was made perfectly passable.

Mr. McWilliams asked the Commissioner of Public Works what action the Government intend to take in respect to a petition (dated April, 1899) from the inhabitants of Lots 11, 12, 13, 14 and 16, Prince County, praying for the construction of a bridge at Grand River, Lot 14.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the petition had been received and the Government Engineer had reported fully on the proposed bridge. His estimate was very high, however, and the government was considering it.

The Attorney General introduced a bill intitled "An Act to provide for short-hand reporting in certain courts in the Province of Prince Edward Island," which was set down for second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House went into committee on the bill further amending the act relative to the registering of deeds and instruments relating to the title of land, Mr. Birch taking the chair. Progress was reported after it had been decided to hold the bill over to a special committee for consideration.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved the House into Committee on a bill amending the act relating to life insurance, Mr. Reid taking the chair. The bill as introduced provides that in case a policy of insurance heretofore or hereafter effected by a married man on the face of it is expressed to be for the benefit of his wife, or of his wife and children or any of them, or in case a policy of insurance heretofore or hereafter issued has been heretofore or shall be hereafter appropriated for the benefit of his wife or of his child or children, or of his wife and children or any of them, and the wife for whose sole benefit it exists, either by the policy of appropriation or by operation of law, predecease her husband, with or without issue, or the child for whose benefit it was effected or appropriated or the surviving child for whose benefit solely it exists, dies before the person insured, then the policy reverts to the insured and the insured may deal therewith as if the insurance had been effected and been always held for his own benefit.

After the bill had been discussed at some length, it was referred to a special committee for consideration.

At the afternoon session, the House went into committee on the second reading of the bill amending the act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors, with Mr. Wise in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment and set down for third reading to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Macdonald the House went into committee on the bill respecting the Hill borough railway and general traffic bridge, with Mr. Wise in the chair.

The bill is along the lines of the resolution passed on Wednesday. In committee it was discussed by Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Farquharson, Mr. Gordon, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Shaw, the latter having the floor at 6 o'clock when the House adjourned until 10 o'clock on Friday.

—Mr. Robert Harris of Montreal, President of the Royal Canadian Academy, has petitioned the Parliament to remedy certain abuses which are said to exist in Canada under the operation of art unions. Mr. Penny a few days ago presented a petition, in which it was contended that the act under which art unions are conducted has been seriously perverted, and that the plan, which was originally intended as a means of encouraging art, has become a mere cloak for gambling and financial gain. It is asserted that the present law has been used as a cover for carrying on lotteries having for their object financial gain and the acquisition of money solely by means of the selling and drawing of tickets and other modes of chance. The petition proceeds to point out that such lotteries, carried on by incorporated companies in the city of Montreal, are in no way an advantage, but rather a detriment, to the cause of art and painting. Mr. Harris states that the Royal Canadian Academy would approve of such a change in the law as it now stands as will render it impossible to carry on games of chance under the guise of art. Mr. Harris protests against the present abuse, and requests that it to be declared illegal.

But that the "saving of the seat" is everything with the Grits, and the legislative representation of the people nothing, is manifest from the facts that Mr. Peters merely appeared in the house, made a speech on the Address, had an interview with the Island treasurer, and almost immediately set out again for the Pacific coast, that's what they call "Liberal" government.
