

Home Nursing Course Concludes At Hazelbrook

The Red Cross home nursing course, which began in Hazelbrook early in September, was completed last night when the members of the class gathered at the home of Mrs. Lawson Wood for the final closing and presentation of acknowledgment cards.

The course, organized through the Women's Institute, covered a period of twelve weeks and the instruction centered around the care of the sick person in the home.

Topics covered included signs of illness, temperature taking, pulse, bed making and bed baths, medicines and treatment, the care of elderly people, artificial respiration, communicable diseases, first aid treatment and the use and demonstration of improvised equipment for home care.

The members of the class were instructed by the Red Cross Home Nursing Supervisor, Miss Ida Mackay.

After the presentation of Red Cross cards, lunch was served and a suitable gift presented to the Red Cross Supervisor, Mrs. Wood, for instructing the class.

It would have been impossible to handle this large number of donors in one afternoon and evening had the Charlottetown clinic been held in Red Cross Headquarters.

Red Cross officials said last evening that if this record attendance can be maintained at the clinics to be held today and tomorrow at Mount Stewart, Rustico, Long Creek and Summerside there will be a sufficient amount of blood to maintain the service for patients in local hospitals and provide some of the blood now required for the manufacture of gamma globulin to aid in the fight against polio.

Large Sea Bass Caught In Hillsboro Yesterday

Two large sea bass were caught in the Hillsboro River yesterday, about half a mile below Mt. Stewart village. Mr. Albert McIntyre was surprised when he hauled his smelt nets to find, the big fish trapped in the meshes. The largest, weighed twenty-two pounds, and the smaller sixteen pounds.

Mr. McIntyre notified the Provincial Department of Industry and Resources of the catch, and Mr. B. Graham Rogers, a department official and Mr. Erskine MacNutt, President of the Queens County Fish and Game Association went to Mt. Stewart, and returned to the city with the big fish. They consulted Mr. Stewart Jones, President of the Maritime Fish and Game Association, and the latter called in Professor Lathian, teacher of biology at Prince of Wales College, to identify the species of fish.

Professor Lathian confirmed that the fish were known as striped sea bass. The Mt. Stewart fisherman had expressed the opinion that the two specimens were sea bass, but the Fish and Game officials were anxious to make the identification positive.

The fishermen also informed Fish and Game officials that another large sea bass was netted a few days ago weighing more than twenty pounds.

According to Mt. Stewart residents a few bass were caught in the river until about ten years ago, but usually in the month of June. For some unknown reason the fish stopped frequenting the Mt. Stewart area, and the fishermen were greatly surprised that they had reappeared, particularly at this time of year.

The Provincial Resources Department is very much interested in reports of sea bass in Provincial waters. If these large game fish moved into Island rivers in any quantities they would attract fishermen from all over America.

According to fishery experts certain species of fish are being caught further north than ever before in history, because it is suggested of the milder winters. It is possible, in line with this theory, say the experts, that other species of fish may also seek feeding grounds north of their usual haunts.

Mt. Stewart fishermen have also had the unusual experience of catching hake and herring in their smelt nets. It is unusual for these fish to wander so far up the rivers.

The two sea bass will be on view in the show windows of Simpson-Sears, on Kent Street today. The store manager, Mr. Stewart Jones, was very much interested in the Mt. Stewart catch, following as it did the landing of the first bass several days ago.

After the first bass was taken Mr. Jones accompanied by Mr. Erskine MacNutt went to Mt. Stewart and the two men tried their luck in the waters, where the bass was netted, hoping to hook one of the big fish, but had no luck.

Since there is no closed season on bass, it is hoped other sportsmen will do a little experimenting, and help to prove whether the fish are plentiful or just a few strays from their usual haunts.

Professor Lathian recalled that two years ago a representative of a sportsman's magazine fished the waters near the Island National Park for striped bass but had no success.

These fish were once very plentiful in the St. John River and in other mainland rivers, but because they lurk in shallow off shore waters, and rise to a lure readily, they have rapidly decreased in numbers.

They spawn in the spring in the estuaries, and in the entrances to fresh water rivers, said Professor Lathian.

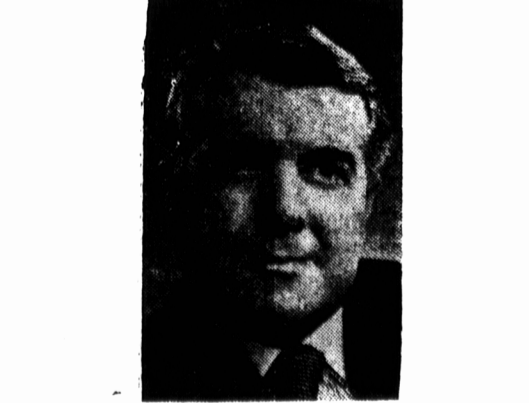
No Recession in U. S. Next Year
