

Offer Of Museum Site Gets Cool Reception From Premier

A substantial dose of cold water has been applied to the proposal for a Provincial Museum in a letter to the Town of Summerside from Premier Jones read at the regular monthly meeting of the council last evening. His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all councillors were present except councillor Clarence Steele who is on leave of absence.

The letter reads: "In reply to your letter of November 15th in which you offer a site in Summerside if the Government will agree to erect a building to be used as a Provincial Museum for the Province of Prince Edward Island, I may say that at no time has the government had under consideration the building of a Museum, and I do not think a decision for the erection of a Museum is imminent."

There was considerable other correspondence read at the meeting. A letter was read from the Department of Highways stating that if the Town would provide a snow plow the department would give priority to the Town as regards the use of this plow. The clerk read a reply stating the Town would agree to this arrangement and expressing appreciation for the offer.

A letter was read from Mr. George Gallant, president of the Summerside branch of Canadian Postal Employees, pointing out the need of a street delivery system for mail in the town. He said that such a system should be pressed for now as the arrangements for the new post office will not adequately will the needs of the people of the town. At present, he said, there are only 750 boxes for over 8,000 people and it is proposed to install only 1,000 in the new office.

Mile's Walk For Mail

He pointed out that some people have to walk as much as a mile for their mail and then stand in line. After this letter was read a strongly worded resolution was passed asking the Post Master General to make an immediate investigation into the need for a delivery service in Summerside.

In regard to a request of the Town for automatic warning signals at all railway crossings, a letter was read from the Board of Transport Commissioners stating that an engineer of the Board would be in Summerside shortly to inspect the crossings.

A request was read from the public health nurse for a grant of

\$200 to help pay the expenses of dental treatment for children unable to afford it. On motion of Councillor Gorrill, seconded by Councillor Driscoll, a grant of \$150.00 was made.

The clerk read a reply from the Federal Department of Public Works in regard to a request from the town that oil be used instead of coal for heating the new Federal building. The letter stated that it did not seem economical to use oil in a district where coal is produced. Councillor Gorrill said that the hospital had investigated this matter and had decided to use bunker oil and they think it will be cheaper than coal. He said it would be a catastrophe if coal were to be used as it would create terrific conditions from smoke.

Councillor Driscoll reporting for the streets department said that the work of installing surface sewers on Granville Street North has been completed and the department men have been busy cleaning sewers and repairing catch basins.

Councillor Schurman said he had notified the police to bring in to court motorists who persist in speeding.

A motion was passed that the Water and Sewage Commission be authorized to drill another artesian well at a cost of \$5,000. This is in addition to the well recently completed.

The clerk reported that over 97 per cent of taxes have been paid and judgments have been taken against any unpaid.—S.

Burglars Enter Four Offices In Summerside

Four professional and business offices in the Smallman building, Summerside including the office of Attorney General W. E. Darby were entered over the week-end and apparently attempts were made to get in others. The thieves, evidently searching for money, found little to reward their efforts. The other offices involved were those of Dr. Vincent Grant, Dr. Bert Hunter and the Helene Curtis Beauty Salon, operated by Mrs. Gladys MacQuarrie.

The breaks were thought to have occurred early Monday morning. The street entrance to the building is not kept locked and in each case entrance to the offices was gained by way of the transom.

In the case of the Helene Curtis Beauty Salon the glass of the transom was smashed but in the others they managed to get in without doing any damage. Numerous fingerprints were left all over the glass of the various transoms. In some offices drawers were opened and desks messed up a bit. A quantity of stamps were missing from Mr. Darby's office and Dr. Grant reported a dispute over

Troops Support Police

The Malaysian nurse, Che Aminah, and the school teacher husband, Inche Mansoor Abadi, sought to reverse the Supreme Court's decision to give the child back to her Dutch parents. They lost her eight years ago during the Japanese occupation of Java.

MacArthur in Conference

Gen. MacArthur, commander of all United Nations forces in Korea, held an hour's secret conference Monday noon with Gen. Almond at an airfield near Hungnam. Allied coastal base MacArthur earlier conferred similarly with Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, Eighth Army commander, and with air force chiefs at Kimp'o airfield, near Seoul.

There was no indication whether the MacArthur conferences brought a decision on evacuating Hungnam. It is the last big United Nations base in the northeast since the abandonment of Wonsan, 50 miles to the south.

Upon returning to Tokyo, MacArthur said in a statement that for the time being United Nations forces in Korea are "relatively secure."

MacArthur declared that the enemy — he did not mention the Chinese by name — had failed in their plan to destroy the U. N. army in one massive blow.

Losses inflicted on the Reds were staggering, while Red claims of U. N. losses were "fantastically exaggerated."

U. S. transports were at hand in Hungnam if orders for its evacuation are given.

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membership, the fate of Formosa, the question of Indo-China, the final fate of Korea itself, among others.

The U. S. has announced that it opposes any move to link the Korean question with other Far Eastern questions.

The Philippines' hesitancy in joining in a vote on the mediation commission was ascribed to its sympathy with the U. S. viewpoint.

All 13 countries will sponsor the cease-fire resolution. The Philippines will not join in sponsoring the mediation measure, but the other 12 countries will.

The general outline of the Korean truce plans followed suggestions of the Pakistan delegation. Sudden, sharp differences imperiled the move for a short time today, but these conferences extending into tonight forged agreement.
