A GRAND ORGAN.—It is said that the new organ for the church of Notre Dame, Montreal, is nearly completed, and will be set up about the end of this month. It is likely to be one of the largest organs on the continent, having 6,000 pipes, 100 registers, 30 pedals, 4 key boards, each with 55 keys. The cost will be \$50,000. The organ was designed by Dr. Duval, of Laval University, and Messrs. Casavant Brothers, of St. Hyacinthe, are the builders. It has been under construction for five years.

DESERTER CAPTURED.—Samuel S. Hancock, the sailor who deserted from H. M. S. Comus on Sunday morning last, was captured a short distance this side of Boston last evening by Sergeant Bentley. The arrest was made on a warrant issued by Captain A. Johnson. Hancock started for Boston as soon as he was ashore on Sunday morning, since which time he has been hiding in the neighborhood of the place where he was captured. The officer had a good deal of trouble in locating his man, but when he did get sight of him the man soon had to give in. Before surrendering himself, however, Hancock gave the officer a long run through woods, swamp and oat fields.

THE RIFLE IN ENGLAND.

Success of Canadians.

TORONTO, July 23. The Empire's staff correspondent cables as follows:— LONDON, July 23.—The English team won the Kolapore Cup, with a score of 704 points. Canada has, however, good reason to be proud of her rifleman. This year's Besley team has managed to put itself upon record in a manner that no previous team has done. For four men out of the twenty to get places in the Queen's hundred is a matter of congratulation, and singular to say, each hails from a different province. Lieut. A. Smith, of St. John, and Capt. Bishop, of Halifax, each took \$60 as a result of the places they occupy in the hundred. Staff Sergt. Ogg, of Guelph, won \$50, and Sergt. Hall, of Waterloo, won \$40, while each of the four received a badge.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 23. Application was made to the Minister of Customs to day by the Collector at Pictou for permission to allow the wrecked American fishing schooner Caroline Vought, which has not a modus vivendi license, now undergoing repairs at that port, to ship a crew and take in shore ballast and provisions for the homeward voyage. Permission was granted with the understanding that the vessel is not to be allowed to take enough supplies for a fishing voyage instead of a homeward trip. The case, moreover, is not to be considered a precedent. General Middleton says that before leaving for England he will have some information relative to the Bremner furs to give to the public.

Adrian Brown is here working up information relative to the West Indies in order to unload it upon Canadian manufacturers.

Labor Day in Halifax—Successful Celebration.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 23. Labor Day was celebrated here with great success. Every section of organized labor took part in the procession, which was one mile long. Many employes occupied conspicuous places in the procession. One of the most interesting features of the parade was the presence of two hundred truckmen on horse back, riding three abreast. The procession was the largest ever seen here on Labor Day, which has now become a fixed institution and grows more successful each year. The day was observed as a public holiday.

A Royal Gift.

TORONTO, July 23. The Queen has presented a case of books to the Library of Toronto University. Among them are thirty volumes of the history of Windsor Castle. Another volume tells of the great seals of England. The gift is an exceptional mark of honor.

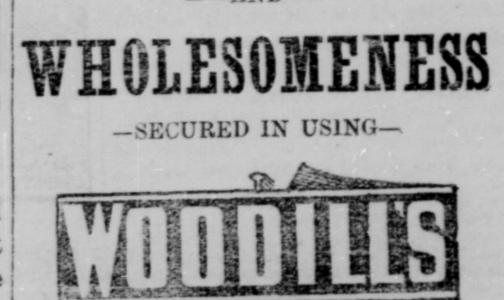
