Scoutmaster's Words Are Cruel Blow To Young Lad

Dear Mary Haworth: One of my sons, I'll call him John, is an A-Student and very interested in scouting. After a year and a half of scouting he is well on his way to becoming a star scout and has been patrol leader for about a year. He has taken his responsibilities very seriously, devoting much time to them; and as a result his patrol has often led in competitions.

John's father has been working in Europe the past six months and I was very happy to have John look up to Mr. B., the troop leader, in his absence. However, last night John accidentally overheard his beloved Mr. B. scolding another scout's mother, because the boy wasn't making any advancement. Mr. B. told this woman that her son had had a good leader in his patrol—"me," he said, "like that John Doe who is so dumb, he doesn't know anything; or if he does, never shows it!"

LACKS SELF-ESTEEM
 Mr. B. had always been very friendly to John, and these unexpected words, voiced behind his back, were a cruel blow to him. Since John is very small for his age we have always had a hard time keeping up his self-confidence, and I find the situation very hard to deal with alone. I would appreciate any advice you can give me, as he is heart-broken. Sincerely, Mrs. M.

OVER-ALL VIEW
 Dear Mrs. M.: In your shoes, I would have got in touch with Mr. B. as soon as possible—out of Johnny's hearing, however, and without his knowing I was making the call. And I would have got down to cases with Mr. B., in a frank friendly way, to learn the scout troop leader's version of the conversation that Johnny overheard.

In asking Mr. B. for the straight story and exploring what he and I could do to bind up the wounds to Johnny's fragile self respect, I would have been prepared to agree that eavesdroppers never hear good of themselves.

I would have conceded that Johnny either ought not to eavesdrop or ought not to complain. He might have moved hastily out of earshot, instead of listening-in on a presumably confidential exchange not meant for him.

OWES REASSURANCE
 I would have conceded also that overheard conversations are almost never heard correctly. A vast amount of mischievous misinformation gets into circulation via this faulty transmission system.

Further, I would have considered the possibility that Johnny's name didn't even figure in the colloquy that made him heart-sick. As we know, many hypersensitive persons tend to imagine they're being noticed, discussed and disparaged in instances when they're not. (And Johnny is chronically unsold on his worth, you say.)

So much for preface. As a scoutmaster, Mr. B. should be man enough to repair the damage to Johnny's punch-drunk self-con-

fidence, even if Johnny was mistaken in feeling hit. On the other hand, supposing Johnny heard correctly, and Mr. B. did criticize him as quoted, then Mr. B. ought to acquaint you with the boy's shortcomings, as he sees them, so that you may do what you can to help the lad, and lighten the scout leader's load a little.

TALK MAY HELP
 Mr. B. should realize it is no favor to the boy to keep his devoted parents in the dark about

his real standing with associates in the scouting field.
