ISSUED FALSE REPORTS AS FROM U. S. ATTACHE.

TORONTO, March 25.—A despatch from Washington to the Mail and Empire says:

The facts regarding the sudden recall of Major J. Langhorne from his post as military attache at Berlin were obtained here yesterday and reported herewith. They explain why Washington officials made such a mystery about the case.

Major Langhorne was recalled because it was discovered that persons in Germany were sending out unauthorized despatches over his name. Astounded by this discovery, and not desiring to raise any embarrassment with the German government, the authorities here decided the best way to deal with the situation was to recall Major Langhorne at once and endeavor to keep the matter from becoming generally known.

The situation was the more delicate because the false despatches credited by persons in Germany to the American military attache dealt not only with military operations, but with political and diplomatic developments in Germany. Naturally, emanating from German sources, they presented the German situation in a most favorable light and discredited on the other hand the achievements of Germany's enemies. Being signed with the name of the American military attache, however, they bore the appearance of impartial reports by a neutral and wholly competent military observer.

The intent seemingly was that the despatches should fall into the hands of Germany's enemies and mislead them as to the German operations and developments. The despatcher did come to the attention of France and Great Britain, but was a result wholly unanticipated by their perpetrators. That is, they led to the discovery of the plot and its abrupt termination by the recall of Major Langhorne.

CAPT. SORCHO OFFERS ENGLAND NEW DEFENSE

LONDON, March 27.—The Daily News says:—"Battleships are not really necessary for the defense of Great Britain's coasts, according to Captain Louis Sorcho, an American citizen, who claims he can show us how the Germans may be foiled if they should attempt serious operations against our shores. Sorcho has arrived in London and is convinced of the value of his idea, and has offered his services to the British Government."

It was Sorcho, who, in 1898, recovered 132 bodies from the battleship Maine. His calling is particularly connected with diving and submarine work, but his new scheme, which he roughly outlined to The Daily News' representative, is mainly dependant on the use of wireless telegraphy in a novel way.

"I have already submitted my idea to my own Government," he said, "and it will in all likelihood be adopted. I am now in negotiation with your Admiralty and expect to have to pay a visit there in a few days."

PRESIDENT WILSON ON JOB WHILE WAR LASTS.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—When President Wilson was asked by callers today where he expects to spend his vacation, he smiled and said that he had not considered a vacation. He replied that his only purpose at present was to remain in Washington, so long as the war continues.

It is the President's purpose to stay at the desk each morning and thresh out the puzzling international questions which arise, and to spend the afternoons between the gold links and the automobile.

Notwithstanding the tremendous weight under which he had been working for many months, the President is in excellent spirits and looks extremely well. The air of the parks and golf links have kept his skin well tanned.

It is understood the President is hopeful of keeping a belated engagement with the people of California but just when he will get to the San Francisco Fair is doubtful.

REV. J. KING WAS FOUND GUILTY.

FREDERICTON, N.B., March 29.—A Ministerial Court, composed of clergymen of the new Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conferences of the Methodist Church, has found a member of the Conference guilty of uttering unpatriotic sentiments from the pulpit. It was learned to-day, Rev. J. King, the minister in charge of the Nashua circuit, was accused of having used unpatriotic language in reference to the part of Great Britain and Canada in the war. The charge was upheld, and the court ordered the President of the Conference to admonish Rev. Mr. King, and recommended that he be removed to another field.

DOUBT RIGHTE OF N. Y. STATE TO POUNCE ON THAW.

NEW YORK, March 29.—Two Justices of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court have agreed that there was a doubt in their minds whether the State of New York would be within its rights to pounce on Harry Thaw after his acquittal here, upon the conspiracy charge on which he was extradited from New Hampshire and returning him to the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan.

They were Justice Ingraham, presiding and Justice Scott. To voice their views they interrupted Franklin Kennedy, special deputy attorney general in charge of the state's case against Thaw, while he was arguing yesterday before the Appellate Division against an appeal taken by Thaw's counsel from a decision of Supreme Justice Page refusing a motion to return Thaw to New Hampshire.

Counsel for Thaw had already presented their arguments, which were based upon the contention that Thaw, having been extradited from New Hampshire and having been tried of that charge, should be returned forthwith to the state from which he was extradited. Mr. Kennedy then began his arguments, which were based upon the contention that even though Thaw had been acquitted of the charge against him, the fact remained that he was now within New York's jurisdiction, and that as the original commitment upon which he was sent to Matteawan was still valid he should be returned there.

Mr. Kennedy referred to the various decisions finding Thaw insane. He was interrupted by Justice Hotchkiss, who impatiently remarked:

"What has that got to do with this case? That is merely a question of fact."

Mr. Kennedy explained that he sought to establish the fact that Thaw had never been given his legal freedom from Matteawan. At this point he was interrupted by Justice Ingraham, who said:

"I am in doubt as to the rights of the State of New York to pounce upon Thaw following his acquittal of crime and then return him to the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan. I believe most citizens of this state would regard such action as dishonourable."

The question involved in this case is whether the State of New York can with honour hold Thaw on the commitment signed subsequent to his second trial, after he was extradited from New Hampshire, tried, and found not guilty, when the commitment ordered his return to Matteawan on a charge that is not extraditable."

Justice Scott agreed with Justice Ingraham. After the conclusion of the arguments, which were brief, decision was received. It was considered probable by attorneys connected with the case that the decision might be handed down during the next week.
