Ship Loading 30,000 Crates Of Potatoes

The Norwegian cargo vessel "Palma" arrived in Charlottetown Saturday morning and docked at Railway Wharf where she has been loading potatoes since. The large freighter is taking on 30,000 crates of potatoes for South America. She will be stopping in New York on her way to pick up some additional cargo. Crates or boxes are being used to ship the potatoes as a o m e method of ventilation is needed for the vegetable in warmer climates. The boxes serve to allow free flow of air around the potatoes. Each box c o n t a i n s 110 pounds of potatoes. The agents for the ship are Associated Shippers and she is expected to sail for New York on Tuesday around noon.
