

Remarkable Progress In Dating Prehistoric Bones

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (Reuters) — Scientists of the department of scientific and industrial research here are dating with remarkable accuracy prehistoric bones and relics from many parts of the world.

Specimens from Australia, Spain, India and Syria have been sent to Wellington for tests to determine their exact age.

T. A. Rafter of the department's physical laboratory, in Wellington, recently told members of the New Zealand Archaeological Association that New Zealand scientists now can determine the age of an organic object as far back as 45,000 years from the constant rate of disintegration of carbon.

The laboratory's work, said Rafter, had included the oldest specimen so far dated anywhere in the world. This was a piece of Kauri wood from Ruakaka, North Auckland, which proved to be 34,000 years old.

Dating of moa bones had enabled archaeologists to give the time of diet changes of the earliest known New Zealand inhabitants, the moa hunters. Tests of bone samples from the Hawkeburn-Pounawea area of central Otago in the South Island indicated that the moa hunters first occupied the area about 1260 A.D. when their diet was chiefly moa, whale and seal flesh.

About 1450, when moa supplies (the moa was an ostrich-like flightless bird) were becoming depleted, the diet was chiefly whale flesh, seal and bird; with a small quantity of shellfish and moa. By 1650, as well as whale, seal flesh and bird flesh, shellfish was used extensively as food, the moa being scarcely represented.

Borneo Observer Sees The Isolation Of The East In Nfld

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A visitor from the Orient says "the aspect of isolation" that he notices in rugged Newfoundland is much similar to that found in many Asian countries.

One of five observers on a tour sponsored under the Colombo plan feels that his own country is confronted with similar fisheries problems to Newfoundland, because of distance between scattered communities.

He was particularly impressed with the Newfoundland Longliner used in fisheries here.

Teo Leng Hong of Singapore, another of the visitors, said some Asian countries employ similar vessels for fishing but they are over-manned. Some of the techniques used by Newfoundland fishermen would be beneficial to the industry in his country, he felt.

An Indonesian representative, C. Wimbombow, went shopping while his companions talked fishing. He later said the independent supermarket would be a welcome boon to his region.

Dr. Douglas J. Wilson of Montreal will be the theme speaker at the first annual conference of United Church Men to be held at Stanhope Beach Inn, September 7-9. Also speaking at the weekend meeting will be Ralston C. Young, "Red Cap 42" from Grand Central Station, New York City. The theme of the conference is "Going His Way."

Keen interest is being evinced in this conference which will include United Church men from all parts of the Province. A group of six men from Halifax headed by Mr. Fred MacKinnon, director of Welfare for the Province of Nova Scotia and Maritime President of Men's Council will be in attendance along with several prominent laymen from Moncton.

It is expected that a representation from the laymen of other communions in the Province will be present for the session in the capacity of observers.

The chairman of the planning committee, Mr. Allison MacKinnon, Charlottetown reports that applications for accommodation at the conference are coming in daily and it is expected that the full quota of 100 men will have been reached before the end of next week. Information concerning the meeting has been placed in the hands of all local pastors and Presidents on men's clubs throughout the Island.

Miss Vera Ramsay, Calgary, Alberta was Dean of the Junior Girls Camp.

Paul Nicholson, of Alberton was Red Cross Swimming Instructor, and though camp sessions were too short to turn out a large number of skilled swimmers, several were awarded pins and certificates in passing the requirements.

Fine weather conditions added greatly to the success of the camps. The camp site and facilities have been considerably improved by the planting of shrubbery, trees and flowers, construction of a walk-in freezing unit and erection of a permanent flag pole.

Japanese Educators Seek An Alphabet For Convenience

TOKYO (Reuters) — Japanese authorities are trying to simplify their complicated language which is hindering communication among their own people and, what is more serious, between Japan and the outside world.

The ministry of education is studying a report on the problem submitted by educational experts. They have considered the possibility of using an alphabet, probably a version of the Roman alphabet, instead of the thousands of characters now required for even the commonest purposes.

Communists' Chia announced it is working on a similar plan to simplify the Chinese language.

For general reading, popular publications such as newspapers and magazines try to limit themselves to about 3,000 characters. For the purposes of higher education and culture, many more characters or combinations must be mastered.
