WASHINGTON (AP)—A 26-year-old U.S. Navy veteran told senators Wednesday he was fired from a navy civilian job as a security risk on grounds his mother and father were in a subversive organization, but was never told the name of the organization.

Joseph H. Summers Jr., of Providence, R. I., said it was suggested to him it "might be a little different if I didn't live with them." His mother, Mrs. Pauline Summers, a native of Chester, Nova Scotia, testified she never had belonged to any organization she knew to be considered Communist or subversive by the government. She has been a resident of Providence for 38 years.

Moral Re-Armament Is Defended In Use Of Planes

GENEVA (AP)—The Moral Re-Armament "World Mission," which has flown 35,000 miles in three U.S. Air Force planes in the last three months, presenting its play, "The Vanishing Island," in 25 cities, ended its tour here Wednesday. The 182 men and women in the mission, including the cast of the musical show which sets forth MRA's ideological message, arrived here from Istanbul and then went to MRA headquarters at Caux, Dr. Frank N. D. Buchman, founder of Moral Re-Armament, was waiting for them there. Congressman Charles B. Deane of North Carolina, who joined the flying MRA troupe after the adjournment of Congress, said in response to a question that the criticism occasioned by the use of air force planes on the long trip was not justified. "I consider it an act of high statesmanship that this force of 192 persons from some 30 countries has been sent around the globe," Deane said. "The terrific response from the very top political leadership of every country visited is convincing evidence that the ideology of this play is applicable to every nation and it is so accepted."

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corp. agreed Thursday to a layoff pay plan for its 139,000 employees, completing establishment of the pattern for a three-year term in the industry's "big three," builders of 95 per cent of the country's automobiles. General Motors Corp. and the Ford Motor Co. signed similar contracts in June. Before the new agreements the firms paid an average of about \$2.10 hourly. Besides the layoff pay plan, and wage increases ranging up to 38 cents an hour, the latter for highly skilled workers, the Chrysler agreement gives the CIO United Auto Workers a union shop. The union got a similar concession from GM this year. Ford has operated as a union shop since its first UAW contract.

STOPPED STRIKES The Chrysler-UAW pact snuffed out strikes in six states which started six hours earlier, but which affected relatively few workers. The company's Chrysler, Desoto, Dodge and Plymouth divisions are down for model changeovers. Picketing started at midnight. The agreement came at 6 a.m.

While new contracts held promise of labor peace for the "Big Three" for the next three years, there was trouble between the dependents - Studebaker - Packard and American Motors - Packard UAW workers in Studebaker division plants of Studebaker-Packard walked out on strike at South Bend, Ind., Thursday, refusing to extend their contract which expired last midnight. They refused six-day extension during negotiations as recommended by local union leaders.

Nine thousand were made idle at South Bend. It was the first official strike against Studebaker in more than 23 years. CONTINUE DEADLOCK In Detroit, American Motors (Nash-Hudson) and the UAW continued in a long deadlock as midnight expiration of a twice-extended contract neared. AMC employs 24,000 in Michigan, Wisconsin and California.

The new UAW-Chrysler agreement eliminates wage differentials between Detroit plants and those elsewhere. Like the Ford and GM layoff pay plan, Chrysler's will guarantee laid off workers \$0.40 to \$0.65 per cent of regular take-home pay for up to 26 weeks of idleness.

Chrysler raised its "annual improvement factor" pay from five to six cents hourly or 2 1/2 per cent, whichever is greater, for 1955, 1956 and 1957. This annual increase is to compensate for increased efficiency of men and machines. Chrysler agreed, as did Ford and GM, to raise maximum pension benefits to \$250 a month, including social security payments. The old maximum was \$200.

Plan Secret Talks On Cyprus LONDON, (Reuters) - Britain, Greece and Turkey decided Thursday night they will start secret negotiations today aimed at breaking their deadlock over the future of the strategic British island colony of Cyprus. The deadlock between the powers have agreed to a co-operative agricultural research program including exchange of information and personnel. ers made complete Thursday when Turkey rejected the idea of self-determination for the island. Britain called the conference after outbreaks of terrorism by native Cypriots in their demand for union with Greece.
