The holdup play in bridge occurs in many different forms. The opportunity to take a trick at a given point naturally does not incur an obligation to do so. On the contrary, both the declarer and the defenders are many times better advised to refuse a trick which can be won.

In most cases, the holdup play occurs in connection with no-trump contracts and is used by the declarer. He refuses to win a trick in a suit which is being pressed until he thinks one of the opponents is exhausted of that suit. The purpose is to interfere

with ready communication between the defenders in that suit. But there are other cases where a trick is not won immediately for an entirely different reason. Today's deal shows one such case. It involves defensive play.

West made a good shot when he opened a club. The ten held and West then played the nine. East won with the jack and continued with the king.

Declarer fretted a while and finally trumped with the ten. West overruffed with the jack and shifted to a diamond. South won with the king, led the queen of hearts, and West was dead whether he covered or not. So declarer made four hearts.

But West slipped mightily when he overtrumped South's ten. He had a sure thing going for him by simply discarding a diamond or a spade when declarer ruffed.

By keeping the K-J-8 intact after South had used the ten, he could assure himself of two trump tricks and certain defeat of the contract. Regardless of what size trump declarer led next, South could cover the card led and then have the two commanding trumps.

There is no ready rule to govern when a trick should be taken or refused. Each case depends on its own special circumstances. Tricks are usually taken, as the opportunity arises, unless there is a good reason not to take them. Judgment is an important factor.

Rule Of Law Ignored Is Charge By Labor

M A N C H E S T E R, England—The smoldering dispute over the 1956 Suez intervention was fanned into an election issue Tuesday night as Prime Minister Macmillan defended the Anglo-French action and Labor Party leader Hugh Gaitskell attacked it.

The two party leaders pushed Suez into the forefront of their tours of Britain to drum up votes for the Oct. 8 general election. The Labor Party bitterly opposed the military action in Suez.

Macmillan, who became prime minister when Sir Anthony Eden resigned after the campaign, declared in a Manchester speech: "There were, and still are, different views held here as to whether we acted rightly or wrongly. I still believe that we were justified and that history will take this view."

He added that "the temptation

to inaction is always greater than the urge to act. So, often, are the dangers."

CHANGE ATTITUDE

In a speech at Bristol, south-western England, Gaitskell said Macmillan and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd now are full of "sweet words" for the United Nations—a different story than in 1956 "when they both were so deeply involved in the Suez aggression."

"Why should we believe they have changed?" Gaitskell asked. "They have never even admitted they were wrong."

"Whatever mistakes that Labor may make or may have made, we would never—never—have done a thing like that. Our record of support of the rule of law in international affairs is not a short-lived one... but a deep conviction proved by our conduct or 40 years."

Touching on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's disarmament proposals to the United Nations, Gaitskell said: "Why could not the British government have given this a warm welcome instead of the tepid comment that we have so far made."

"Of course, there must be controls and inspection. We all know that. So does Mr. Khrushchev. We should have accepted the proposals in principle at once and then got down to brass tacks on the details to test them out."

REDS WANT PEACE

Macmillan told his audience of 6,000 he does not believe the Russian leaders wanted war.

He spoke of Khrushchev's proposals that all countries abolish their armaments in four years and Britain's plan for the reduction of all weapons under a system of international inspection.

"Both plans now will be studied by the international committee which we have agreed with the Russians to set up," he said. "Let us hope that this work will be fruitful. We shall certainly do it if we can make it so."

But, he said, it was important to make sure that when nations were able to get rid of the nuclear bomb they would not be left at the mercy of overwhelming forces with conventional arms.

Red Blasted By Cardinals

NEW YORK (AP)—Two American Roman Catholic cardinals spoke out Sunday against the visit of Premier Khrushchev.

Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of New York, in dedicating a chapel at West Point, N.Y., did not mention Khrushchev by name.

But he spoke of the "sorcerer" and "assassin" who is offering America the "barbecue of 'consumer competition' and 'peaceful coexistence'."

Retired Cardinal Cushing of Boston directed his speech to Khrushchev in a talk recorded at South Bend, Ind., for later broadcast.

Cardinal Cushing asserted that Lenin said on his deathbed he had made a great mistake but "it is too late to turn back now."

"Mr. Khrushchev, guest of our president: It is not too late for you to turn back," the cardinal said. "That you will do so, I have encouraged millions of people to pray for you and your people during your visit to our country."

Mars Rocket Seen Possible

HONG KONG (Reuters) — A leading Soviet scientist said Sunday Russia now has the capacity — as far as velocity, weight and power are concerned — to launch rockets to Mars or Venus.

Academician Evgeny Fedorov made the statement in Moscow to the official Communist Chinese news agency.

He added that it would require a more accurately guided vehicle than the one that hit the moon last week. Judging by the success of that one, it would not be difficult to launch other types of rockets to the moon, Fedorov said.

Fedorov gave these detail of the moon rocket:

It had better instruments aboard than Lunik I, which now is in orbit around the sun, including an altimeter to register distance from the moon's surface and a better device for measuring the moon's magnetic field.
