REGULATIONS FOR LENT.—The regulations for Lent for this diocese were given out by Rev. Dr. Morrison at High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday. This season every day except Sunday will be a fast day, two ounces of solid food only being permitted in the morning and eight ounces in the evening. The use of flesh meat is permitted at the principal meal every day of the week excepting Wednesdays and Fridays, Holy Saturday and the Saturdays of Ember days.

The church was filled to the utmost. Rev. Mr. McConnell preached to a sympathetic congregation and made touching reference to the British general now in South Africa. He paid the last public expression of sympathy for the relatives of Alfred Riggs in a worthy manner and spoke of that young man's estimable character and his eagerness to go to the war. Rev. Mr. McConnell mentioned the fact that he had received a letter from Alfred Riggs in which the writer stated that he was succeeding in christian work among the wayward soldiers.

New York, March 3.—R. G. Dun's weekly review says that, the iron and steel industry continues the greatest weekly output ever known, even while men speak of it as waiting for more definite assurance about the future. Prices of pig yield a little, some sales of Bessemer having been made at Pittsburgh for \$24, and anthracite No. 1 is quoted here at \$23.50. Billets have been sold at \$33 at Pittsburgh. For most finished products, prices are stronger than a week ago, or as strong, bars and sheets being strengthened by large business, while only plate appears weaker.

BURIAL AT VERNON RIVER.—The funeral of Mrs. John Wright, of Cherry Valley, was held yesterday afternoon, the interment being in the Roman Catholic cemetery at Vernon River. The attendance of mourning friends and neighbors was large, there being upwards of one hundred sleighs in the procession. The services in the church and at the grave were taken by Rev. Dr. Doyle. The pall-bearers were Messrs. R. Jenkins, E. Vesser, P. Delahanty, C. Mutch, J. McDonald and D. McGillivray.

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.—A grand musical, dramatic and literary entertainment will form the programme for the St. Patrick's evening celebration at Emerald, March 17th. The Emerald Dramatic Club will present the thrilling drama "The Irish Agent." It promises to be highly successful, judging from the cast of characters. Rev. J. M. LAID TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Catherine Connolly was held this morning, and there was a large attendance of citizens. The services at St. Dunstan's Cathedral and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Dr. Morrison. The pall-bearers were Thomas Campbell, James Eden, William Murray, James Murphy, Michael Duffy and John Johnston. The deceased was the mother of Mr. John Connolly, of the late firm of Connolly, Bros., and was well and favorably known in the community. Her son and other relatives have our sympathy.

LENTEN SERMONS.—Special sermons were yesterday preached in St. Dunstan's Cathedral and in St. Peter's Cathedral and St. Paul's Church. The sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral was delivered by Father Campbell the theme being the "Trinity" with special reference to the Second Person. In St. Paul's the Rector preached at both services, the morning subject being "Church Worship," and the evening subject "The origin and transmission of sin." In St. Peter's Cathedral Rev. Mr. Hunt preached in the morning and Rev. Mr. Simpson in the evening. The subjects were all clearly and forcibly presented, and the congregations large.
