West, of course, was gambling when he overcalled with four clubs, but his distribution looked good, and he had reason to suspect that South's huge opening had been based on a long diamond suit, since he himself was void. North brought to mind a six notrump, not wishing to announce his diamonds. Incidentally, rigid "point-counters" will probably object to South's three-notrump opening on the ground that he was one point short of the 25 required for this system, but it is to be doubted that South will "go broke"

by employing this tactic if he holds hundreds of similar hands! West led the spade king. South looked at the dummy and counted a tricks. He counted one spade, two hearts, five hearts, five diamonds and four clubs, and since the total was satisfactory, he won the first trick and, simply as a formality, laid down the diamond king. The 3-0 break was most annoying, but there was nothing South could do about it, to save himself. When he ran off his four clubs, hoping to embarrass East, the latter solved the discarding problem easily enough by giving up one spade and two hearts.

It goes without saying that South ran up against an extraordinary break in diamonds, but it is in just such hands as this that an expert proves his mettle — or, to put it more explicitly, his capacity for taking "care." South couldn't win more than 12 tricks under any normal circumstances, so why not let West win the first trick? Observe the drastic effect of this "generosity." With the first trick conceded to West and with the diamond break soon revealed, see what the lead of South's four clubs would then do to poor East.

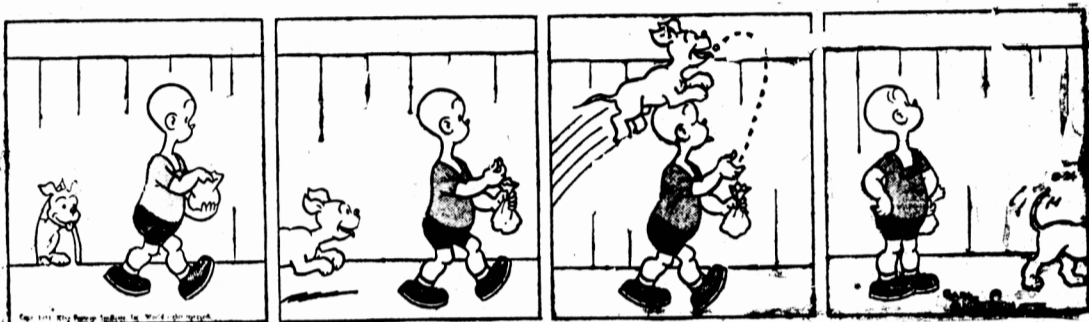

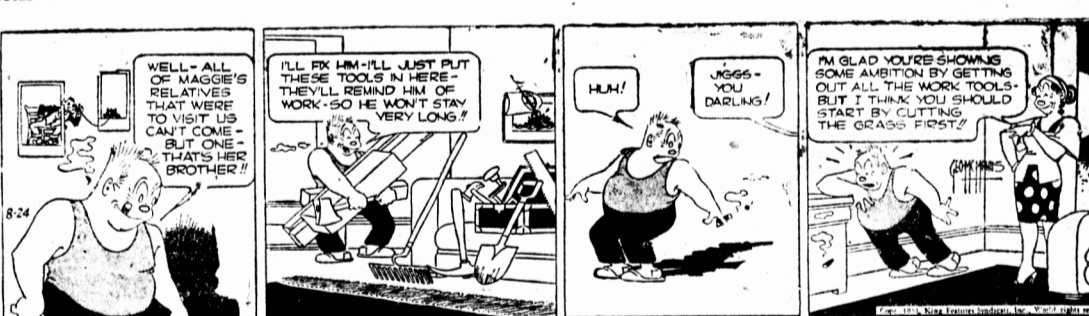
