Chinese Open New Attack On Central Front

Total Of \$304,000 For P. E. I. In Supplementary Estimates In Commons

OTTAWA, June 25 — (Special) — Although Federal Spending has been heavily slashed by steel shortages and defence projects the Government proposes to spend \$304,000 this year in Prince Edward Island, chiefly on essential wharf and harbor improvements. This was revealed in supplementary estimates tabled in the Commons to clean up projects which failed to gain a listing in the main estimates tabled two months ago.

Of the total, largest single amount is \$130,000 for the development of Savage Harbor in King's County, just across the border from Queens. Principal factor in this project is cutting a ship channel through a sandbar blocking the harbor entrance. The channel will be made permanent by means of piling and revetment walls to prevent sand and silt from interfering with navigation.

This is the sole large new project in the latest list of federal expenditures in the province. It was tabled as essential and placed in the estimates by Works Minister Fournier after representations had been made by T. J. Kichham, Liberal Member for King's and Senator J. J. McIntyre who is particularly familiar with the needs of that area.

Wharf at Ch'Town
Second largest item is \$100,000, which is required to complete the wharf construction and improvements at Charlottetown harbor. Another project in Queen's County is dredging and improvements to Rustico Harbor at an estimated cost of \$83,000. A vote of \$10,500 is earmarked for a breakwater extension at North Lake in Kings, and \$10,000 for a breastwork at Darnley Basin in Prince. The latter amount is in addition to extensive construction already embarked on to develop this Basin as an important fishing centre.

A vote of \$8,500 is listed for Ferry Landings both on the Mainland and the Island Beaches of Lennox Island in Prince County.

Kensington Building
In estimates for the architect's branch of the Public Works Department, an amount of \$12,000 is listed for a public building at Kensington in Prince County. While this sum is a revote, it is pointed out that work on a new Kensington Post Office could not proceed last year because of the inability of federal authorities to find a suitable site. (The present building is not only too small for the services it is called on to perform, but its basement suffers from flooding in the spring)

Is Optimistic For Cease-Fire

WASHINGTON, June 25 — (AP) — Naorollah Entezam, president of the United Nations Assembly, said today a Korean cease-fire would "not be too difficult to arrange, if goodwill exists on Russia's part. Russia's peace proposal raises 'new hopes' for a settlement, he said. But he added: "Maybe I am too optimistic."

Entezam, Iranian ambassador to the United States, left for New York late today in an optimistic mood. He said he will immediately seek out Jakob Malik, Russia's delegate to the U. N., and try to advance the cease-fire proposal made Saturday.

Fight Continues To Rage This Morning

TOKYO, June 26 — (Tuesday) — (AP) — It was war as usual in Korea today, despite talk elsewhere of a possible cease-fire. The Communists opened a new attack near the centre of the front shortly after midnight and the fight still raged this morning.

Lt.-Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U.S. Eighth Army commander, was informed today that the Communist China radio had voiced qualified endorsement of the suggestion by Russia's United Nations delegate, Jakob Malik, for a cease-fire at the 38th parallel. Van Fleet reacted by repeating what he had said Sunday — "business as usual."

And the "business" was bloody and bitter. Tuesday's mid-morning communique of the U.S. Eighth Army said an unknown number of Reds attacked at five minutes after midnight east of Kumhwa. That Allied-won southeast anchor of the old "iron triangle" is about 20 miles north of parallel 38 in Central Korea. The assault was made in the same sector where earlier Allied troops had been ousted from ridge positions defending Kum-sung. That Communist build-up point is 12 miles northeast of Kumhwa. The communique said the new attack still was in progress two hours later, the last report on it. In Western Korea, Allied troops broke contact and withdrew Monday night after a day of bayonet fighting. The Allies had tried vainly to drive hard-fighting Chinese from hill entrenchments

Police Calming Teen-agers In Edmonton, Alta.

EDMONTON, June 25 — (CP) — Chief Constable Reg Jennings said today that "flying squads" of police cars are "calming down" the teen-agers and service men whose street fighting has plagued Edmonton for more than a week. Chief Jennings said Sunday night was "very quiet" following the arrest of 15 men Saturday. The 15 were arrested Saturday night as police patrols cracked down on groups of teen-agers and service men before fights could begin. Cars carrying members of either of the factions were stopped and occupants searched for concealed weapons. Hundreds of curious citizens hampered police action as they did earlier in the week. Many traffic snarls resulted from motorists who slowed down to a snail's pace whenever they thought a fight would begin. Numerous complaints were received by police from persons who said their cars had been stopped by service personnel and the occupants searched and in some cases beaten.

Allan Shaft Miners Going To Cape Breton

STELLARTON, N. S. June 25 — (CP) — Some 150 of this town's miners are leaving this week for jobs in Cape Breton's coal mines pending re-opening of the Allan Shaft here. The shaft was sealed two weeks ago when burning gas was discovered. Water, now rising in the pit, will eventually curb the menace but it is not known how long the mine will be idle.

Canadian Wounded To Receive Treat

TOKYO, June 25 — (AP) — It is hot and muggy but wounded Canadian soldiers in hospital in Korea have a cool treat coming. They have been advised that the Vancouver Women's Auxiliary of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry is sending over by plane 400 pounds of strawberries and ice cream, packed in dry ice. The treat was donated by the Growers' Association of Mission, B.C., the Fraser Valley Milk Producers' Association and Canadian Pacific Airlines. The shipment is due Thursday.

Truro School Struck By Lightning

TRURO, N. S. June 25 — (CP) — Lightning struck the Nova Scotia Normal School here today at the height of a downpour which left streets running like rivers at the end of 10 minutes. The lightning flash started a blaze which firemen had out before it went far. Streets in the downtown business district were flooded to a depth of from six to 12 inches and scores of house-holders reported basements inundated.

No Record Of Mysterious Ming Sung Company Here

Local interest attaches to the charges made in the House of Commons with regard to the activities of the Ming Sung Industrial Company of Canada alleged to be incorporated in Charlottetown and operating in Communist controlled waters under the Canadian flag. An intensive search yesterday failed to locate any such company here. The company has been much in the news since it was revealed by Opposition Leader George Drew that seven ships were transferred from the parent Chinese company to its Canadian subsidiary and the ships transferred to Canadian registry. By special orders-in-council the ships were permitted to operate without the full complement of officers qualified under the Canada Shipping Act but flying the Canadian flag. The incorporators of the company with head office given as Charlottetown were: Robert de Wolfe Mackay, Stewart Bowman Ralston, Claude Marcel Tetrault and Arthur Mitchell Weldon, advocates, Evelyn Lehman and Jessie Stein, stenographers, all of Montreal. R. de Wolfe Mackay is the secretary-treasurer and a Canadian Press story gives Thomas G. Wang as being a vice-president. The company operated some converted former Canadian corvettes in Oriental waters, allegedly dealing with Communist China. Under the Federal Companies Act a company incorporated as this one was, by letters patent from the Secretary of State, must have a head office and any change of head office must be published in the Canada Gazette. No such notice of change appears to have been so published and the several firms maintaining head offices for domiciled companies here deny being head office for this company. One trust company had correspondence with the Montreal firm which incorporated the company but a head office was never established, nor was a license obtained from the Provincial Government as required by P. E. I. law.

Divorce Committee Would Like To Quit

OTTAWA, June 25 — (CP) — Member Senate divorce committee figures the time has come to go out of business. The committee tonight presented its final report to the Upper Chamber, recording 286 divorces this session for couples in Quebec and Newfoundland. Members suggested some other body take over the hearing of applications from the two Provinces, the only ones without divorce courts. Whether this comes about or not, the chairman, Senator William Aseltine, 64-year-old Progressive Conservative lawyer-farmer from Rosetown, Sask., wants to retire. After 10 years he finds the work takes too much of his time. The committee said it regrets "that Parliament has not seen fit to solve the problem of parliamentary divorce by settling up suitable courts or tribunals before which the numerous cases from Quebec and Newfoundland can be heard. "It is to be hoped that something will be done in that regard in the near future."

Urges Payment Of Exchange On U. S. Currency

HALIFAX, June 25 — (CP) — The urgency of merchants, hotel keepers, taxi drivers and all others doing business with United States tourists to pay correct exchange on U. S. currency was stressed in a statement today by the Nova Scotia Government Bureau of Information. Exchange, no longer pegged, has been about six per cent since the middle of May. The statement said "visitors from the U. S. realize, with very few exceptions, that the United States dollar is at a premium in Nova Scotia. They expect to be paid this premium without having to request it. When it is not paid, or not paid until requested, a decidedly unfavorable opinion is formed. As the tourist business of our Province, which amounts to millions of dollars during the season, is built very largely on good-will, the importance of building up rather than tearing down this good-will cannot be over emphasized. To neglect to voluntarily pay the premium due on United States money is to stand in our own light."

Appoint Governor Of Saskatchewan

OTTAWA, June 26 — (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent today announced the appointment of W. J. Patterson, member of the Board of Transport Commissioners, as Lieutenant-Governor of Saskatchewan. The 65-year-old Mr. Patterson, Premier of Saskatchewan from 1955 to 1944, succeeds the late Dr. J. M. Urich. This is the first time that a native of Saskatchewan has become Lieutenant-Governor of the Province. Born at Grenfell, Mr. Patterson played a prominent part in the development of the Province. In turn clerk, bank manager and insurance agent, he entered the Saskatchewan Legislature in 1921 as a Liberal. He was appointed to a Cabinet post four years later, and remained in provincial politics until his appointment to the Transport Board two years ago.

MacLEAN VICTORIOUS IN QUEEN'S COUNTY

OTTAWA, June 25 — (CP) — The Progressive Conservatives won four Federal by-elections today, gaining three seats from the Liberals and an increased majority in the other. The Progressive Conservatives retained the Ontario constituency of Waterloo South. They captured the former Liberal seats of Queen's in Prince Edward Island and Brandon and Winnipeg South Centre in Manitoba.

In Queen's
Mr. J. Angus MacLean, Progressive Conservative and veteran of distinguished war service, was elected over Liberal opposition in yesterday's Federal by-election in the Queen's constituency of Prince Edward Island.

With 116 of 118 polls heard from, Mr. MacLean had received 9,426 votes as compared with 9,013 for Mr. Cecil A. Miller, Liberal candidate in the two-party contest. Some 20,000 persons were eligible to vote in the riding. Early voting was slow yesterday but picked up during the afternoon, only to be hampered again by heavy rain in the last three hours of balloting. The election became necessary with the death of Mr. J. Lester Douglas. One of the few remaining dual ridings in the country, Queen's had been held since 1945 by a Liberal and a Progressive Conservative, Mr. W. Chester S. McLure.

Mr. MacLean, an R.C.A.F. Wing Commander during the war, was shot down in the first 1,000-bomber raid on the Ruhr Valley. He was listed as missing for six months but made his way to safety on foot with the aid of the Dutch and French underground. Later he became the Air Force's chief of hazardous research and development branch at Rockcliffe Airport, near Ottawa. He was decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Waterloo South
GALT, Ont., June 25 — (CP) — Howie Meeker stickhanded his way out of the National Hockey League into Canada's House of Commons today. The 170-pound gamecock, carrying the Progressive Conservative banner, put into his campaign as much energy as into his right-wing patrol for Toronto Maple Leafs over the last five N. H. L. seasons. The result was an emphatic victory as he held the seat for his party against C. C. F. and Liberal opposition. He got a bigger majority than the margin in the 1949 general election for Karl Hornuth, popular political veteran whose death

Coupled with this testimony, O'Donnell warned Soviet Russia that atom-bomb-carrying American bombers are ready to deliver "the most horribly-destructive blow the world has ever

seen" if Russia provokes war. Winding up some 2,045,000 words of testimony by 13 witnesses, O'Donnell said Allied planes should have been permitted to strike at the enemy in Manchuria last fall when the Chinese Communists entered the Korean war. "We could have really hit them hard and perhaps even stopped them." As to fears that the bombing of Manchurian targets might have brought Soviet intervention and ignited a third world war, as Administration witnesses have said, O'Donnell commented: "I don't think the Russians would have dared move. I think they would have feared an attack on their main cities in Europe."

Both the radio and the paper are Communist organs but by this method the Peiping regime itself was not positively committed. The Red view of its importance was made clearly evident, however, by the fact that the lengthy text of the editorial was broadcast fully in English, Chinese and other languages. Giving the Red version of the first year of the Korean conflict, the editorial reiterated the fami-
