Terrible Conflagration in Hamilton.

The most disastrous conflagration which has ever occurred in Hamilton, Ont., broke out on Friday afternoon. The alarm was for fire in McInnes' block, on the corner of King and John Streets. The block was a large five story solid stone structure, one of the finest in the city, and was occupied by D. McInnes & Co., wholesale dry goods merchants; Furner Livingston & Co., wholesale millinery dealers; the Hamilton Provident and Loan Society, and Bank of Hamilton. The fire started in the fifth story, in the part occupied by Furner, Livingston & Co., and the flames spread with lightning rapidity. Although the firemen were promptly on hand, the fire had already made great headway and was sweeping everything before it, making all efforts to stay its progress unavailing. So scorching was the heat, the firemen were unable at first to play on the burning building, while the burning cinders flew so thick and fast that it was feared at one time that the whole business centre of the city was doomed. The buildings in the immediate vicinity were on fire several times, but by great efforts the fires were extinguished, and the fire confined to John and King streets. The bank-books and Messrs. McInnes' books were all saved. So black looking at one time was the prospect that assistance was telegraphed for to St. Catharines and Toronto, but by 9.30 p. m. the fire had about burnt itself out—not, however, until McInnes' block was completely gutted. The fine new warehouse of Tanford, Vail and Bickley, occupied also on the ground floor, by the Merchants' Bank and Dixon Bros., wholesale fruit dealers, opposite McInnes' block, caught fire and was badly burned. The bank books are no doubt safe in the vault of the bank and will be saved, as the fire did not obtain such headway in this building. The total loss will reach probably half a million dollars. Insurance companies will lose heavily.

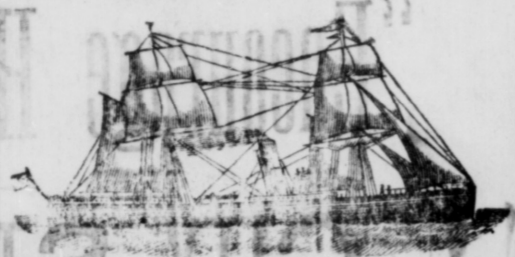
