New York: Stocks lower; moderate decline.

Canadian Dollar

NEW YORK (CP)—The Canadian dollar was unchanged at a premium of 3 1/2 per cent in terms of U. S. funds Monday. Pound sterling down 3-32 of a cent at \$2.78 3/4.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market fell away Monday in the sharpest decline of the last six weeks. The fall was general but it was moderate.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 90 cents. The greatest slide since Aug. 31. It closed at 136.40, just a dollar under the high of the year. Volume hit 2,100,000 shares.

Tung-Sol Electric was the day's most active issue up 1 1/4 at 28 1/4 on 47,000 shares. The fall was general but it was moderate.

Among losers were Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, Sinclair Oil, American Telephone, Kennecott Copper, Allied Chemical, Dow Chemical, Westinghouse Electric, American Tobacco, Texas Pacific Land Trust, Standard Oil of California, Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Goodrich, Rohr Aircraft and Radio Corp.

Stocks advancing included Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, U.S. Pipe and Foundry, Amerasia Petroleum, Baltimore and Ohio, Royal Dutch Petroleum, and South American Gold and Platinum.

The American stock exchange was mixed with many oils trading higher. Volume came to 830,000 shares.

Canadian issues were mixed. Hiram Walker added 1/4. McIntyre fell 1/4 and Distillers Seagram lost 1/4. Canadian Pacific, Dome Mines and International Nickel all remained unchanged.

On the American stock exchange Royalite Oil and Giant Yellowknife both slipped 1/4 while Lake Shore remained unchanged.

Chrysler Gives Press Review of New Models

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corporation spent \$250,000,000 developing and bringing to the assembly lines the 1955 model cars with which it expects to recapture much if not all of the sales volume it lost this year.

That was the message L. L. Goertz, Chrysler president, gave newspaper men at a press preview of the new models Monday.

The new models shown by Chrysler are scheduled for public introduction in November.

Released for publication at the press preview were only details that the new cars are longer, lower and broader appearing, with new V-8 engines for all lines, including Plymouth, Dodge, De Soto and Chrysler.

All have wrap-around windshields, long straight fender lines with front and rear lights pitching outward at the top. All are completely new from bumper to bumper.

Chrysler withheld details concerning the power output of the new engines, but said in some instances they are as much as 50 per cent higher than the 1954 power plants. Prices also are being withheld until each line is introduced separately.

Claims Indians Shouldn't Pay Income Tax Or Duty

CAUGHNAWAGA, Que. (CP)—The North American Indian Brotherhood today began the study of income tax and Canadian-United States border regulations at its 11th annual convention.

Andrew Paul, president of the brotherhood, said "Indians have no vote and therefore should pay no income tax."

He is one of 80 Canadian Indian chiefs attending the three-day convention of the brotherhood which opened Tuesday on this reservation on the outskirts of Montreal.

At present Canada's Indians pay tax on money earned outside their reservations, said the chief of the Squamish Indians of North Vancouver.

"This is partial to prairie and west coast Indians who live on their reservations by farming and fishing," Chief Paul said. "Those who live near cities—like the Caughnawaga Indians—are forced to work in urban communities. They shouldn't have to pay income tax."

He said a treaty between England and the United States signed

in 1794 gave Indians the right to travel freely across the Canadian-American border and to transport personal property.

Yet an Indian was forced last year to pay duty on a refrigerator from the United States, he said. The convention will decide whether to appeal the judgment.

The brotherhood also expects to decide at the meeting—the first ever to be held outside Ottawa—whether to ask the federal government for a relaxation of liquor laws in all the provinces. At present only Indians of Ontario and British Columbia are allowed to patronize licensed establishments.

Despite the issues to be studied at the convention, Canadian Indians are better off now than ever before, he said. The Canadian government spent \$30,000,000 last year in family allowances, pensions and other benefits to help better the living conditions of the Indians.

Chief Paul, founder of the brotherhood, said Canada's Indian population now increases by 1,500 persons every year although it once seemed doomed to extinction. The official census registers 136,000 Indians in Canada, but he said he believes the actual number is almost 180,000.

Drought Reduces U. S. Corn, Wheat

WASHINGTON (AP)—The agriculture department Monday estimated this year's drought-affected corn crop at 2,949,643,000 bushels and the wheat crop at 959,258,000 bushels.

The corn estimate is 22,998,000 bushels less than last month's official forecast of 2,972,641,000 bushels. It compares with last year's crop of 3,176,615,000 bushels and with the 10-year (1943-52) average of 3,057,464,000 bushels.

The wheat estimate is 2,877,000 bushels less than last month's forecast of 962,135,000 bushels. Production last year was 1,168,536,000 bushels compared with the 10-year average of 1,121,506,000.

Both drought and government planting restrictions served to cut the indicated production of these two major grain crops below last year.

Bandits Rob Credit Union

PONT ROUGE, Que. (CP)—Two bandits robbed the Pont Rouge, caisse populaire (credit union) of \$10,000 Thursday, police reported. Pont Rouge is 25 miles northwest of Quebec.

Police said two unmasked men walked into the private house in which the credit union is located and one drew a revolver.

Cashier Francoise Paquette told police she fled to the kitchen but one of the men told her in French: "Don't be afraid. This is just a holdup and all we want is money."

She said she and manager Jeanette Dore gave them the money from the open safe. They then walked out to their car in front of the building and fled north.
