Death Of Diplomat Was One Of Top News Breaks

The extra burden that kills was placed on the shoulders of E. Herbert Norman, gifted Canadian ambassador to Egypt.

Sensitive, scholarly Norman, 47, crushed by Washington reports linking his name with communism in the past, jumped to his death from a high building in Cairo.

The diplomat was weary and worn from the strain of his Egyptian post during the worst of the Middle East crisis.

External Affairs Minister Pearson was joined in Ottawa by Opposition speakers when he termed the Washington charges against Norman "beneath contempt."

Norman, son of a missionary and reared in Japan, showed the oriental influence of his youth in a pathetic farewell to his wife, Irene:

"I kiss your feet and I beg you to forgive me for what I am doing."

BRITAIN MOVES Britain made her long-heralded move to ease her pinched economy by shedding some defence costs in a revolutionary new program.

"It must be frankly recognized," a government white paper said, "that there is at present no means of providing adequate protection for the people of this country against the consequences of an attack with nuclear weapons."

The government therefore looked to hydrogen bombs and ballistic rockets of the future as deterrents to a 1st attack. British troops will be withdrawn from Korea and progressively reduced in Libya and West Germany.

And Britain hopes to end the draft after the end of 1960.

Adjustment Will

Continued from page 1 negotiations were confined to potato tariffs only, whereas the unfavorable set-up which has been in effect was the result of a couple of package deals (i.e., Canadian tariff adjustments on several items in return for U.S. adjustments on several other items).

The Potato Board as well as the other Island organizations which have been pressing for a tariff adjustment have been aware of the above limitations in our mind the Board took the initiative in arranging a meeting of the three Island members of the Canadian Horticultural Council and representatives of the Federation of Agriculture. At this meeting, held Dec. 27th, representatives of these bodies reached unanimous agreement as to the extent of the concessions which would afford to make to U.S.A. in return for a year round 37 1/2 cents Canadian tariff. The agreement announced yesterday is within the limits agreed on although the exception for new potatoes was not considered at that time.

While the Canadian tariff changes became effective at midnight last night the United States Government has not yet announced the reduced quotas. When speaking to a Federal Government official in Ottawa last night he expressed the view that since it appears unlikely that even the reduced quotas will be filled this year, the United States Government might not take any immediate action. As of March 16th total Canadian exports to U.S.A. were only 394,000 bushels of tablestock and 1,533,000 bushels of seed.

In yesterday's announcement we see a portion of our aim accomplished and we are appreciative of the efforts which have brought this about. However, our ultimate objective should be equal tariffs, without quotas or exceptions, high enough to afford the grower some protection in his home markets, and low enough to permit trade between the two neighbours. There is still considerable equalizing to be promoted, and this is no time to rest on our oars, as GATT agreements expire at the end of 1957 and new negotiations will likely be conducted during the summer months.

RIVER OPENING With the icebreaker Montcalm running interference, the British freighter Manchester Mariner arrived in Montreal, opening the 1957 navigation season at the world's largest inland port.

Montreal's harbor lights were ablaze for the night arrival, major annual event on the St. Lawrence River.

RAPIDS CLOSED The historic Log Sault Rapids on the St. Lawrence were sealed off by a dam in connection with the seaway.

A 50-foot gap in a 1,440-foot coffer dam was completed by dropping steel frames into the fast-moving river, backed up by tons of rock. It was a major job on the seaway.

The rapids were the scene of a heroic stand in 1860 when 18 Galant Frenchmen fought to the death to hold a fort for a week against a much larger force of Iroquois.
