Charlottetown Horses and the Charlottetown Track to the Front. (Halifax Recorder.)

The following is a list of provincial turf records made on provincial tracks, except where otherwise specified; the name of the animal, color, sex, place and date record was made, and name and residence of present owner. It shows the speed which has been reached by horses in the provinces, as well as by those that have been bred here and gone abroad, and the time made in races on provincial tracks.
