THE DREDGE REPAIRS.

The Patriot of last evening waxed eloquent over the EXAMINER'S statement that certain repairs to the Government steam-dredge which could have been done in Charlottetown were sent to New Glasgow, N. S., thus depriving our people of the labor and the value. It makes the statement upon the authority of a thoroughly competent mechanic, that the work referred to could not have been done here and that such work has not been done here in the past. In reply we have to say that we have the assurance of another thoroughly competent mechanical authority that this class of work has been done here before and could be done here now; that there are at least two shops in Charlottetown where repairs to the dredge could have been made, or in which, if need be, a new ball could have been constructed. The Patriot is right respecting the well-equipped machine shops we have in Charlottetown, and we would like to see them encouraged to the fullest possible extent. It is to be hoped that in future the Patriot will use its influence to have all work that can be performed here go to our local mechanics.

THAT ALLEGED OFFER.

SOME of the Grit correspondents at Ottawa recently sent to a story to the effect that in 1890 Sir John Macdonald offered to retire from the Premiership, which would be assumed by the Hon. David Mills, who, with five other Liberals, would have seats in the Coalition Cabinet. This story, of course, found its way into the columns of the Guardian. But, as the Montreal Gazette remarks, it is expecting very much to think that the story will be believed. Sir John Macdonald evidently thought considerable of Mr. Mills' ability and current report has it that an intimation from the sage that it might be accepted would have brought him an offer of a portfolio in the Conservative Government. But, as the Gazette further points out, it was not like Sir John Macdonald to give up the reins of power to a political opponent, especially when he had in his own Cabinet two men of his own views of the capacity of Sir John Abbott and Sir John Thompson, with every qualification for leadership, and ability that Mr. Mills himself will admit was of the first order. It will require more than newspaper report to make people believe that there is anything in the affair.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—Joe Martin has gone back to Winnipeg with it the portfolio of Minister of the Interior, and, according to reports, completely disgusted with his reception at Ottawa. —It is said that the two members for Ottawa are almost distracted by the number of applications for positions in the public service. Over six hundred names are already recorded on the books of the reform club. —An Ottawa despatch says: The report that Sir John Macdonald once made overtures to Mr. Mills in favor of a coalition government is ridiculed here. Mr. Pope, Sir John's biographer, knowing nothing of the matter. —The Mail and Empire says it is announced that Premier Laurier is having a new scutcheon manufactured to suit the existing situation. The device will be a soap suds rampant, and the motto a dual one: "Memo me impune laesit," and "rich dien." —According to a recent despatch from Winnipeg, the friends of Joe Martin say that he will not accept a portfolio in the Laurier ministry unless Laurier pledges himself not to coerce Manitoba. The New western thinks, however, that if Martin is offered a portfolio, he will jump at it and ask no questions. —It is said that the Liberals of Saskatchewan are divided over Mr. Laurier's request that they allow Patterson of Ban to become their representative. Most of them think that if Mr. Laurier will not represent them they should have a local man, and several prominent Liberals are eager to run. —It is rumored in Winnipeg that Greenway, Sifton and Provincial Secretary Cameron will shortly go east to have a conference with Mr. Laurier on the question. The Premier and attorney general admit that they will shortly take a trip, but declared that it will simply be a holiday's visit. —The New York World says: "The universal and sincere expressions of regret and sympathy called for by the death of ex-Governor Russell on the part of the Canadian authorities and people are as creditable to them as they are gratifying to us. They should be appreciated and remembered as the evidence of that real friendship which should always mark the relations of two adjoining civilized powers, and which does undoubtedly mark the relations between Canada and the United States." —Montreal Gazette: Among the questions worrying Mr. Laurier now are the reelection of a Minister of the Interior from the eastern part of the West, and the approaching demand of the prohibitionists for a plebiscite. By and by the people who want separate schools in Manitoba, and those who want them not, will begin the contest for control of his ministerial mind, and then the tariff will start its movement. He will hardly have begun to smell the fragrance of the rose of power till the thorns thereof are scratching his nose. —It is announced that Hon. Mr. Laurier has taken for three months Major Chapman's furnished house on O'Connor street. Sir Oliver Mowat has limited his lease of Judge Sedgwick's house to three months. None of the other Ministers have, as far as has been learned, made any provision yet for moving their families to Ottawa. It looks as if they prefer to wait until after the session and the bye elections, when they will be in a better position to judge whether it will be worth while taking up residence in Ottawa at all.

NEWS NOTES.

The new wheat crop of Manitoba is variously estimated at from twelve millions to thirty million bushels. Joseph Wesley Harper, senior member of the firm of Harper Brothers, publishers, died at New York on Tuesday. A Dublin friend of Lady Aberdeen has sent her a team of horses to replace those drowned at the time of the accident this spring. John Bean, a Long Island railway section hand, earning \$7 a week, has by the will of Bernard Earle, who was his uncle, received \$100,000. After several months of agitation, a strike of the various organizations constituting the Brotherhood of Tailors in New York has been declared. Dr. Salmon, the 107-year old English physician, has just died at Cambridge. After the battle of Waterloo he crossed to Brussels to care for the wounded. A despatch to the London Times says that native uprisings are reported from the Malay Peninsula and the Japanese there are said to be hard pressed. Gorman Swan killed his three yearling children one mile south of Attica, Me., at 3 o'clock on Tuesday morning, set fire to the house and then shot himself. The hotel proprietors of Ocean Grove, N. J., have boycotted the negro delegates to the Epworth League Convention there, and other quarters had to be provided. The army worm has at last made its appearance in the vicinity of Maine, and is reported as having done considerable damage to crops in the vicinity of Cape Elizabeth. Serious disturbances recently occurred at Niksar, in the valley of Siva, between Mussulmans and Armenian Christians. Sixty of the former and 340 of the latter were killed. The severest rain storm known in years was that which passed over some parts of the Dominion on Monday night. The heavy rain, 200 feet long, and Conway's mills, houses, etc., at Benson's creek, were swept away. Mr. Balfour announced in the House of Commons on Monday that he feared there would not be time enough this session to pass the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill, but that efforts would be made for the passing of the Irish Land Bill. In spite of strong pressure brought to bear by Sir Donald Smith, the Imperial Government has finally refused to permit the Uster Company to erect on the live stock wharf at Beaufort a building in which to slaughter Canadian cattle. A fire that broke out at Canoe, Island of Crete, on Sunday, was mistaken as a signal for the Turks to massacre the Christians, and a panic ensued. Marines from the British and Austrian men of war, lying off the port were landed before the error was discovered. The cholera in Egypt shows a great abatement according to Monday's reports, which show that there were 159 new cases and 119 deaths the previous day. There were, however, no deaths at Cairo or Alexandria. One death is reported in the army in the frontier. Advances from Berlin state that six of the imperial princes may be seen daily riding bicycles in the park at Wilhelmstrasse. This is the report from the Emperor, but under the tuition of the two eldest sons, both expert bicyclists, and on a wheel built for her under the Emperor's directions, she is making rapid progress. The first trial at bar since the famous Eichborne claimant case began on Monday in London, when Dr. Jameson and his companions were arraigned for invading the South African Republic. Sir Henry Clarke, for the defendants, moved that the indictments be quashed, and after hearing Sir Richard Webster in reply, the court adjourned. The United States Government have had a nice swindle perpetrated on them by a well digger, who received \$5,000 for his work. The wells when tested had a flow of 50,000 gallons a day, but when they were wanted for use they were dry. An excavation showed that the water had been supplied by a terra cotta pipe from a small stream a short distance away. All Kansas city banks have ceased issuing gold either in exchange for bills or in payment of checks or withdrawal of deposits. The St. Louis banks will take the same action. The reason given by the bankers for this move is that it was the evident intention of many depositors to withdraw deposits in gold and hoard the yellow metal in the belief that it would go to a premium. A despatch from Peking says that a commercial treaty between China and Japan has been signed at that city. It is based upon the treaty of Shimonski. Under its provisions China grants to Japan favored treatment, but Japan does not reciprocate. Japanese factories may be established in China, but the duties that may be laid against their output has not been fixed. Advice from Rome state that the new ministry recently presented itself in parliament on Tuesday. Premier Rudini read a declaration, reviewing the recent ministerial crisis. He stated that in order to carry out the plan formulated under the previous ministry for reorganization of the army, it would have been necessary to make a provision in the budget of 1897 for 239,000,000 lire for that purpose. An official telegram from Cape Town states that Sir Frederic Harrington attacked one of the rebel strongholds in the Matopo Hills and killed the rebels on Tuesday afternoon carried their position. The fighting lasted several hours. It is estimated that 60 of the Matabele were killed. Three of the British force were killed and 11 wounded. The heirs of the late Jay Gould, the multi-millionaire, are engaged at present in fighting a law-suit in which \$1,000,000, and perhaps more, is involved. The suit is brought by a lady residing in Rouse's Point, N. Y., who claims that she was married to the millionaire in 1853, when he was then a young man of 18, and was employed on the Lake Champlain and Ogdensburg Railroad, which runs from Rouse's Point to Ogdensburg. A Chicago despatch tells of a borax trust being formed with a capital of \$2,500,000. It aims to control the world's product, and this object it seeks to accomplish by having acquired all the borax lands and buildings in the United States, and at Belvedere, Kent, Eng., the products of crude borax in Colorado, Nevada, California and Oregon, etc. The company will be known as the Pacific Borax and Redwood Chemical Works (Limited). THE HERBERT FULLER TRAGEDY.

Some Further Particulars of the Shocking Affair. Exchanges at hand this morning are filled with details of the shocking tragedy on board the Herbert Fuller, of which the EXAMINER was advised by telegraph on Tuesday from Halifax. The Herbert Fuller, according to one of the stories sent out from Halifax, arrived at that port on Tuesday morning, flying the stars and stripes at half mast with a black flag immediately under. This indicated mutiny, but it was learned that it was far worse than mutiny, it was horrible butchery. The Herbert Fuller left Boston on July 15th for Rosario with a cargo of lumber. So far as is known things went well till the morning of the 14th, when Capt. Nash, his wife Laura and second mate Blaneberg, a Finlander, murdered. The crime was committed with an axe about 2 o'clock. Capt. Nash was in his room, and his wife was murdered in her sleeping apartment. The rooms were covered with blood, and showed evidence of a bitter and awful fight. Mate Thomas Brane was suspected and placed in irons. The ship was then headed for land and made Halifax. There was one passenger on board, Frank Monck, of Boston, who is a Harvard man going for a sea voyage for his health. His room was between that of the captain and his wife. He is supposed to have known more about the crime than anyone, except the man who did the butchery. He and the other crew were placed under arrest on the ship's arrival at Halifax, and instructions were given them not to say a word to anyone. The bodies, which were horribly mutilated were all placed in a box behind the vessel. The murdered captain is 44, his wife 37. The crew numbered ten, and the captain's wife and passenger Monck made a total of twelve on board. When the Halifax police entered the chart room of the Herbert Fuller a horrible sight met their view. The couch on which the captain rested during his voyages was strewn with blood, and the chairs were upset, and charts, etc., strewn about. The walls were spattered with blood. Everything indicated that the captain made a terrible fight for life. The apartment of the second mate, who had also been murdered, gave evidence of struggles. Sergt. Lehan noticed one of the sailors at the wheel and questioned him. The sailor intimated that the mate was the murderer. He said he saw the mate murder the captain through the window. Lehan ordered the sailor under arrest, and he was handcuffed together with the mate. Lehan Monck says he was awakened by a scream which he took to be made by the captain's wife. He seized his revolver and rushed towards the noise. He saw the mate rush out of the cabin and seize a plank with which he struck the woman, then taking the axe he smashed her on the head and cut off both her hands. The mate then met Monck, who asked him what was the matter, and he tried to put him off by asking the same question. Brane, the mate, said he did not know anything of the murder until it was over. When Sergt. Lehan entered the cabin a horrible sight met him. The floor was covered with blood, and the woman's hair was strewn all over, where it had been pulled out. Detective Power had the first mate stripped of his clothing, and stains of blood were found on them. The mate is the hardest looking man in the crew. Chas. Brown, a sailor, gave a statement to Detective Power. He said: "I was at the wheel and Brane, the first mate, was on watch on deck. He went below to the foot of the ladder and rushed for the captain's room, saw him strike the captain with the axe. The captain fell to the floor dead. Brane then rushed into the mate's room and smashed his head in. The sailor did not see him kill the captain's wife. According to another despatch the facts all go to show that the murder was committed by the first mate. The motive was jealousy. Brane was in love with the captain's wife, who had considerable money about her, or else it was a criminal assault upon Captain Nash's wife. Permission has been granted by the Canadian Government for the immediate removal of the bodies and they will be forwarded to Harrington, Maine. It is likely that extradition proceedings will be granted expeditiously by the Government and the eight prisoners will soon be removed to either Boston or New York for trial. Brane is said to be a mulatto, born in St. Kitts, West Indies, but hails from Boston, having been naturalized there in 1883. Immense crowds have viewed the mutilated bodies, which are exposed to the public gaze. The latest advice is to the effect that mate Brane protests his innocence, and declares that seaman Brown, who was at the wheel, must have committed the crime. Brown, as has been already stated, charges the first mate with being guilty. But Brown was at the wheel at the time the murder is said to have been committed, and his absence therefrom for any length of time would quickly have been noticed. He could only have committed the crime by the collusion of the mate.
